A LARGE and excited meeting of shareholders in the Montreal Loan and Mortgage company was held in Montreal on the 8th inst. The creditors report showed that the books have been kept irregularly, and that the absconding secretary and treasurer, George W. Craig, is a defaulter to the extent of at least \$50,000. PREPARATIONS for the Carnival in Citizens' Skating Rink, on the 18th inst., are being made on a large scale. The Directors are exerting themselves to make it the grandest ever held in Charlottetown, and they are meeting with success. Already a large number of ladies and gentlemen have signified their intention of taking part. MR. A. N. LARGE, Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, has received from the Board of Underwriters the appointment of Fire Inspector. He will, in a few days, commence to inspect the stores and residences of the city. We therefore advise all citizens to have their stores, fire-places, chimneys and hose ladders in proper order. AT the invitation of His Grace the Most Rev. Archbishop O'Brien, of Halifax, Father Ryan, the poet-priest, will spend next summer with him. That should be a happy and most pleasant re-union. There are not two poets on the American continent with minds so harmoniously attuned as those of the Archbishop and the poet-priest. The columns of the Catholic Herald have been illuminated by the production of both their pens.—Boston Catholic Herald. SEVEN MEN have been arrested at Joggins' Mines, N. S., on charge of forcibly entering the Roman Catholic church of that place and breaking the altar, burning flowers and vases, stealing the chalice and desecrating the vestments. The distasteful sacrilege was committed on Christmas eve, but the perpetrators kept out of the way till pay day, when they made their appearance and were arrested. They will be examined at Amherst by Stipendiary Cutten. A WOMAN named Frances Campbell, aged forty, dropped dead on Tuesday night while dancing a Highland fling during a carousal in a house of ill-fame kept by May Somers at 92 Wolfe street. Dr. Lachapelle was sent for but too late to render any assistance. He attributes death to the bursting of a blood vessel. The coroner was notified, and decided not to hold an inquest. The unfortunate woman belonged to a respectable New Brunswick family.—Montreal Gazette. "MESSENGER BOY" CAPTURES A RUNAWAY. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) Egyptian News. CAIRO, Jan. 10. A column of troops sent from Berber has succeeded in relieving the garrison at Gerireh with a loss of sixty-four men. Col. Cotelogan telegraphs from Khartoum imploring orders for retreat, as a third of his troops are disaffected, and the inhabitants are hostile. The formation of the cabinet has been completed, Nubar Pasha, President of the Council, takes the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Ministry of Public Instruction; and Abdurrahman Ruchdi Pasha the Ministry of Public Works. The remainder of the cabinet is made up as was previously indicated. Mr. Clifford Lloyd will be Under Secretary of the Ministry of the Interior. Dubar Pasha believes that Egypt will prosper only by union with England.

CIVIC ELECTION BY THE MAYOR

IN pursuance of an act of the General Assembly of this Island, made and passed in the forty-third year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to amend the Act of the eighteenth Victoria, Chapter thirty-four, intituled 'An Act to Incorporate the town of Charlottetown and all Acts amending the same.' I do hereby give public notice that an Election of a Mayor and one person to Serve as a Common Councilman in the City Council for each Ward of said City, Being in all a MAYOR and FIVE COMMON COUNCILMEN, will be held on WEDNESDAY, the 23rd Day of January, A. D., 1884.

DESCRIPTION OF WARDS.

At the several places, that it is to say: In Ward No. 1, at or near the store of Messrs. J. & T. Morris, corner of Queen and Water Streets. In Ward No. 2, at or near the house of Thomas Connolly, opposite Mr. R. Hearty's Warehouse, Sydney Street, between Great George and Prince Streets. In Ward No. 3, at or near the Market House. In Ward No. 4, at or near the Fire Engine House, fronting on Kent Street, east, between Weymouth and Cumberland Streets. In Ward No. 5, at or near the house of Widow Tierney, corner of Euston and Great George Streets. And at the said Election the Poll will be opened at nine o'clock in the forenoon, and continue open until five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day.

NOMINATION DAY.

Act 43, Victoria, Cap. 15.—Seven Days before the time of any and every election for Mayor or Councillors, the Person or Candidates for the office of Mayor or Councillor shall give their names in as such Candidates to the City Clerk and the City Clerk shall duly enter the names, residences and offices of such persons, together with the address and wards for which they are candidates, and such entry, when made, shall be deemed nomination for such candidates. There shall be paid by each person so nominated for Mayor, at the same time, a fee of ten dollars, and by each person so nominated as Councillor, a fee of five dollars which sums shall go toward paying the cost of the election. No person shall be qualified either for the office of Mayor or Councillor unless such nomination be made in manner and the time aforesaid. The time appointed for the nomination of candidates, shall be from the time of twelve at noon, until the hour of four o'clock in the afternoon of the day fixed for that purpose.
