A number of passengers of molasses were thrown ashore and saved. They were brought to Halifax and delivered to Mr. Musgrave for salvage. UNDER CERTAIN CONDITIONS.—The full text of the will of the late Mark Curry, of Windsor, N. S., provides that the \$10,000 left to his niece, Lucy Maud Wilson, wife of Rev. Sydney Wilson, "is to be free from the control and not subject in any way to the debts or management of her husband." THE LATEST TREATY.—The last issue of the Canada Gazette contains a copy of a commercial treaty between Her Majesty the Queen of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India, and His Highness the Seyid bin-Saeed, Sultan of Muscat and Oman, accompanied by a notification from the British Government that if Canada desires to come in under the treaty she is at liberty to do so. DOWN ON HOOPSKIRTS.—Senator Board has introduced a bill in the Indiana Legislature to prevent the manufacture and sale of hoopskirts in that state. It declares that the fashion of wearing hoopskirts revived by a combination of fashion producers and dress goods manufacturers. Women are compelled to wear them by a fear of being ostracized by society. Senator Board is 26 years of age and unmarried. A COLLECTION.—This morning's Guardian says: "The Dominion Coal Co., of Montreal, are about purchasing the five steamers of the Black Diamond Line. This looks as if the Miramichi will be the only Montreal steamer running to this port next summer." We are authorized by Peake Bros. & Co. to say that the above statement is not true. The steamers of the Black Diamond Line will run here as usual next summer. A NICK LEGAL POINT.—The Halifax Herald says: An interesting case was tried to-day in the county court. The plaintiff is Dr. Farrell and the defendants the representatives of the late John Rutledge. The deceased was a patient at the hospital and was attended by Dr. Farrell. The defendants claim that patients admitted to the hospital are not obliged to pay doctor's fees. The plaintiff contends that when a person is in a position to pay, he or his estate is obliged to do so. Eight doctors were called to give evidence on this point. The late John Rutledge's estate is valued at \$5,000. ST. DUNSTON'S CATHEDRAL.—The first of the series of special sermons on "The Sacraments," to be given in St. Dunstan's Cathedral during the holy season of Lent was delivered last evening by Rev. P. A. McElmeel, of Killybegs, "Epiphany" was the sacrament covered. The reverend gentleman, after a brief review of all the Sacraments, proceeded to deal particularly with the Sacrament of Baptism, showing its Divine origin, and pointing out the manner of performing the rite and the necessity thereof as its proper administration. The sermon occupied about three quarters of an hour in its delivery. There was a large congregation. The next sermon of the series will be given on Sunday next at 7 p. m., by Rev. Ronald Macdonald, of Rustico. Subject: "Penance—the Priest has the Power to Forgive Sins."
