**United Baptist Sessions End**

WOODSTOCK, N.B. (CP)—The Maritime United Baptist convention entered its annual session when 1,300 delegates and visitors attended the convention service Sunday.

The convention's five-year program, including an objective of \$250,000, was reviewed in panel discussion Saturday. Earl Peverill, Bedford, N.S., urged the church members to give in proportion to their earnings. Although earning power had increased by 440 per cent since 1939, church giving had risen by only about 220 per cent.

The five-year plan for evangelism calls for enrolment of 3,600 persons annually. One speaker said statistics showed only half of Canadian children attend Sunday school.

"Pastoral services are the greatest need in our churches today," said the superintendent of home missions, Rev. R. E. Whitney, Wolfville, N.S. Half of all missioners, and ministers came from home mission areas.

For the first time, the convention granted a women the right to ordination. She is Mrs. Josephine Kinley Moore of Prince William, N.B.
