TO LOBSTER PACKERS.—Mr. Brecken, M. P., last evening received a despatch from Ottawa stating that the Acting Minister of Marine had decided not to extend the lobster fishing season this year.

VALUABLE CARGO.—The brig, "Parnell," owned by M. Foley, cleared from Halifax on the 6th inst. for London, with a cargo of 12,534 cases of preserved lobsters, valued at \$62,570, and other cargo, the full value of which is \$66,245.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—We regret to hear that a very melancholy accident occurred at St. Eleonors on Friday evening last. A son of Mr. William Tanton about 14 years of age, was driving a horse and cart, the horse ran away, upset the cart, which passed over the poor fellow's body, killing him instantly. SOME TIME ago it was stated that Miss Augusta Steadman, of Mill Village, who graduated from the Women's Medical College of New York in May last, was the first lady graduate from Nova Scotia. A singular item went the rounds in 1873, stating that Miss Anne Maxwell, of Mount Thom, Pictou, who graduated from the Medical College, Philadelphia, was the first Nova Scotia lady to take the degree of Doctor of Medicine. Two others graduated in 1874. They belonged to the Cornwallis Valley. If there are any other claimants to priority (and there may be), we would be happy to hear of them.

THE meeting of Liberal Conservatives held last evening, to make arrangements for the reception of Sir Leonard Tilley and Hon. Mr. Caron was well attended, notwithstanding the disagreeable weather, by leading citizens. All present seemed anxious that the best possible reception should be given to those distinguished gentlemen, and a strong committee was appointed for the purpose. From the tone of last night's meeting, and well-known energy of those who attended it, we have no doubt that Sir Leonard and Mr. Caron will receive a grand ovation on their arrival here.

A CURIOUS explosion occurred in a New Glasgow, N. S., drug store, on August 4. The shop is divided longitudinally, making the retail shop and store room both with glass front towards the street. In the store room is a common canvas stove, with flat top, used in summer for chemical purposes, heating water, &c., and used with fire probably once a week. It is customary in sweeping the shop to put the refuse in the stove, and the accumulation starts the fire. At the above hour, the boy struck a match and applied it to the paper, when an explosion occurred, blowing out the glass and sash and bending the iron shutter bars outwards, throwing the glass in thousands of pieces across the street. The door into the retail department was torn off the hinges, splitting the frame and the glassware on the shelves in the retail shop was thrown down. The iron cover of the stove, weighing probably five or six pounds, was driven through the plastered ceiling, making a hole large enough to put the stove through, and a general wreck of the storeroom. Young Cavanagh, the boy, the brother of the surviving partner, is badly burned about the face. James McLeod, the clerk, is scorched and his eyes filled with debris.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.

A London special says that much interest is felt here in the Irish meeting at Chicago, though little information on the subject is at hand.

Sir William Vernon Harcourt's statement respecting the action of the Washington Government, regarding explosive machines, gives great satisfaction. It is regarded as significant, and interesting that Hartman has found it necessary to leave the United States. Englishmen do not consider that these diabolical schemes emanate from a political movement worthy of the name, but believe them to be the acts of a gang of desperadoes outside of the sympathies of the American people.

A Troy despatch says that William Kennedy, an inventor of this city, is reported to have invented the sinking apparatus of the Fenian ram which was found in New York Bay. Kennedy, who is an enthusiastic Fenian, says the ram was a miniature model with a defect which can be remedied by an invention known only to one man. The larger vessel will carry forty men, can be provisioned for six months, can run seven miles an hour, stay 1,000 feet under water for four hours, and after ten minutes respite on water can go down again four hours more.

A London special says the Home Secretary has been notified that the Prince of Wales and party are to be blown up in their yacht at the Isle of Wight, and that a clock-work machine has been placed in Westminster Abbey to kill the Duke of Edinburgh.

ROME, Aug. 7.

Three thousand people to-day attended at a meeting called to make a demonstration in favor of the abrogation of the Papal Guarantees Law. The chairman, Sig. Peroni, was a person who was condemned to a term of penal servitude under the Pontifical Government. After several speeches, a resolution was proposed declaring the abrogation of the law indispensable. The police delegates present refused to allow the resolution to be put, when some disturbance ensued, but the meeting finally dispersed quietly. Addresses were read from Garibaldi, Louis Blanc and Victor Hugo.

CHICAGO, Aug. 8.

The Tribune this morning, referring to the Irish conclave, says the meeting is composed mainly of representatives of the Clan-na-Gael Society and Emmet Monument Association. Measures were taken to disassociate the Irish name and nation from the insane ravings of O'Donovan Rossa, and to unite the governing body of the various organizations in one, with headquarters outside of New York or Philadelphia. It was desired to use greater exertions to equip Irish revolutionists with war material, and to settle bickerings about the skirmishing fund.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 7.

The "Journal de St. Petersburg," replying to newspaper criticisms accusing Russia of paying too much deference to the susceptibilities of England concerning Central Asia, says Russia, for her own interests and not from a regard for England, has fallen back in Central Asia. She, in this respect, was guided by the same rational motives as those which dictated the judicious policy of Mr. Gladstone relative to Afghanistan.

LONDON, Aug. 8.

The Standard's correspondent at Rome says that serious proposals have been made recently to the Pope that he should transfer the seat of the Holy See to America, where an independent position will be assured him.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Aug. 7.

Last evening, on a railroad train at Shannondale, George Wright, a passenger, while sitting in his seat in a coach, was approached from behind by two men, one of whom buried a hatchet in his skull; the other fired a pistol ball into his head. The murderers rushed from the car and escaped.

LONDON, Aug. 8.

The Standard's despatch from Vienna says that a Nihilist named Grunberg, of noble birth, has been arrested at Belgrade. It is stated that the police found documents upon him proving that Nihilists and Socialists have designs respectively on the lives of the Czar and Emperor William.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.

A London despatch says great dissatisfaction was caused last week by a decision of the International Medical Congress not to admit lady doctors to the meeting. Forty-three properly qualified lady practitioners entered a protest against this exclusion from practical meetings, although ladies were admitted to six preceding Congresses. The protest had no effect. It is stated in a letter to the Daily News that the decision of the Congress was influenced by the Queen. At a preliminary meeting of the executive committee a majority were in favor of ladies being admitted, but they were over-ruled by Sir William Jenner, who declared that he was empowered to remove the name of the Queen as a patron of the Congress if lady doctors were admitted to medical meetings.

BUFFALO, Aug. 6.

Two children named Willie Wisser and Chas. Parker were burned to death at East Aurora yesterday while lighting a fire with kerosene.

TAUNTON, Mass., Aug. 7.

Two large mills belonging to the Old Colony Iron Company, were burned this morning. Loss between \$150,000 and \$200,000. Three hundred men are out of employment.
