ST. PETER'S CATHEDRAL.

Dedication of Reredos—Memorial to Miss Rosa Stewart—Rev.

James Simpson, M. A., on Reverence and Devotion.

On Sunday morning, a handsome oak reredos, designed by Mr. W. C. Harris, R. C. A., which had been placed in position during the week in St. Peter's Cathedral, was solemnly dedicated to the service of Almighty God. This reredos has been erected as a memorial to the late Miss Rosa M. Stewart, who was a member of the congregation, and for many years a most indefatigable worker in the various guilds and societies. Chiefly was she interested in the cause of missions, and she inspired many with zeal like her own. The cost of the work was defrayed partly by a sum of money which Miss Stewart left for the decoration of the church and partly by the voluntary contributions of a few of her friends and fellow-workers who wished to commemorate her good deeds.

The Rev. Jas. Simpson preached in the forenoon on the appointing of our Lord's feet with very precious ointment by Mary of Bethany, and claimed that Jesus, in commending the action, sanctioned the dedication of costly gifts to beautify His Sanctuary, although a utilitarian age might consider such a waste. Dignified and solemn places of worship tend, the urged to make men more reverent, and to realize God's presence better; and if such an end is accomplished, they cannot be considered waste. People are very ready to suggest that handsome decorations in God's House might have been sold and given to the poor; but they are not so ready to apply the same rule to their own houses, which often are full of useless ornaments and luxurious furniture. Again, it is considered quite fitting to erect a handsome stone monument in a cemetery for some departed loved one; but if a memorial is placed in a church to help to beautify it, the question is asked, "Why this waste?" Would Jesus, who accepted the gifts of the wise men at His birth, who was twice anointed with precious ointments, and was embalmed in a hundred pounds weight of myrrh and aloes at His death,—would He call any gift offered to Him in humble and loving devotion waste? Surely not; and we do not hesitate to ask Him to accept the gift of this reredos, praying at the same time that He will use it and the other decorations of the church,—as He has used many costly and beautiful gifts since the erection of the tabernacle in the wilderness,—to increase the reverence, love, zeal and devotion of those who worship Him.

Local and Other Items

Opera House to-night.

C.M.B.A.—Branch No 216, C.M.B.A., will meet in the A.O.H. hall this evening at 8 o'clock.

MASONRY.—The regular communication of Victoria Lodge, No 2, A. F. and A. M., will be held in their Lodge room tonight at 8 o'clock sharp. Matters of great importance will come up for discussion, and every officer and member is earnestly requested to be in his place on time.

POLICE COURT.—This morning the case of Margaret E. J. Ware was adjourned till the 11th inst. The case of Patrick Cullen, charged with injury to property, was adjourned till the 11th inst, the defendant being released on his own bail. The case of Ernest Rooney was dismissed and that of Wm. Luby adjourned till the 6th inst. Matthew Gallant was fined \$2 or 10 days. Joseph Welsh and Frank McMillan were each fined \$3 or 15 days for drunkenness. William Doyle, for drunkenness, was remanded.

BURGLARIES.—There were two burglaries in Charlottetown between Saturday night and Sunday morning. The stores of Driscoll & Hornsby and R. B. Morton & Co., were the scenes of operations. In both cases an entrance was effected from the rear of the establishments, and a 2-inch augur was used. In Norton & Co's store two doors were bored through and a large iron bolt fastening the inside door removed. In Driscoll & Hornsby's store holes were bored through an outside shutter after which the window inside was opened. There was no money taken from this store, but some of the stock was appropriated. At Norton & Co's store between \$2 and \$3 in cash was taken from the till and about \$70 worth of goods from the show case. This forenoon an augur and chisel, such as were used by the burglars, were found in the old Stevenson building adjoining Driscoll & Hornsby's. Ten or twelve knife boxes, such as were stolen from Norton's, were also found there. But the knives had been removed.

HAS COME TO CHARLOTTETOWN.—The Halifax Herald says: James G. Jamieson, for many years employed with Brown & Webb, of this city, has bought out the drug business at Charlottetown, formerly owned by Dr. Dodd, and left yesterday for Charlottetown, accompanied by Mrs. Jamieson, to take over the business. Mr. and Mrs. Jamieson are very popular with a large number of friends in Halifax, who will wish them success in their new enterprise. Before severing his connection with the firm yesterday, he was handed a letter from Brown and Webb, expressing appreciation for past services and good wishes for the future, also enclosing a check for a generous amount, after which Mr. Bell, on behalf of the employees of the firm, presented Mr. Jamieson with an address, accompanied by a handsome piece of silver, suitably engraved, as a token of the esteem in which he was held. Mr. Jamieson feelingly replied and said he would always look back with pleasure on the many hours he had spent with his old firm, Brown and Webb, and their employees.
