MONTREAL, Oct. 11 — (CP) — Leon Lalonde of Montreal has been appointed editor of the Canadian Bar Review. It was announced yesterday. He succeeds Louis-Philippe Pigeon of Quebec. He is also non-ordinary secretary of the Canadian Maritime Law Association.

MONTREAL, Oct. 13 — (CP) — Defence Minister Claxton took the salute yesterday as more than 5,000 Canadian army troops took part in a garrison parade, largest show of its kind here since the Second World War. Thousands of persons lined the five-mile route to watch the display.

Impressive Ceremony At St. Georges As New Roman Catholic Church Dedicated

The St. Georges Roman Catholic Church was formally dedicated in a very impressive ceremony on Sunday, October 12th, with the laying of the corner stone, and the blessing of the church by His Excellency, James Boyle, Bishop of Charlottetown, assisted by Rev. J. A. Sullivan as deacon; and Rev. J. W. McCord as sub-deacon. Rev. P. W. McMahon, P.D., acted as master of ceremonies. A capacity crowd witnessed the official ceremonies which opened the new church completed this year. The former church, erected in 1860, was demolished by fire on Easter Sunday, 1943, and services since then have been held in the parish hall.

Following the dedication ceremonies, Solemn High Mass was celebrated by Rev. R. V. MacKenzie, D.P., rector of St. Dunstan's University, assisted by Rev. George MacDonald as deacon, and Rev. George MacCormac, as sub-deacon. Rev. P. McKenna acted as master of ceremonies, and Rev. P. L. MacDonald as assistant master of ceremonies. His Excellency, Bishop Boyle, assisted from the throne.

During the service the church choir, under the direction of Rev. Bernard Gillis, sang the Mass, and also appropriate hymns. Father Bennet MacDonald, parish priest, spoke of the great loss to the parish on the burning of the church nine years ago, and how the parishioners had worked to assist in replacing it. He thanked all those who had assisted and contributed to provide a new church despite the many hardships which it must have entailed.

He expressed his appreciation to His Excellency for attending and participating in the opening, and also Rt. Rev. Monsignor G. J. MacLellan, V.G., of Summerside for the donation of the main altar contributed in honor of Rev. Francis MacDonald, who erected the first church.

He then introduced Monsignor MacLellan, the guest preacher, who taking as his text, Psalm 25, vs. 8 "O Lord, I love the house in which You dwell", gave the interesting history of the parish, stating that from 1802-1806 it was a mission parish, and in 1806 Rev. Father MacEachern became its first resident priest. In 1840 Father Francis MacDonald was appointed as pastor, and remained until his death in 1900.

It was in 1860 that he chose the site and erected the first church. Monsignor MacLellan paid tribute to the initiative and industry of Father MacDonald, and stated that it was fitting that the main altar should be dedicated to his memory.

He went on to say that the church would be a central point for the religious life of the community from birth to death, and would figure in importance throughout the whole life of its parishioners. At the conclusion of the Holy Sacrifice of Mass, His Excellency Bishop Boyle gave a brief address, expressing his gratitude to Father MacDonald for the enormous task which he and his parishioners had undertaken in erecting a new church to replace the former one, whose loss, he said, had been a serious one to the parish. He congratulated Father MacDonald on his success in completing the church, saying that the parishioners were fortunate in having such a capable and excellent leader.

MacDonald, Rev. L. Landrigan, Rev. S. Gallant, Rev. A. L. Herrell, Rev. T. B. Butler. Also present at the service were Sisters of Notre Dame and St. Martha.

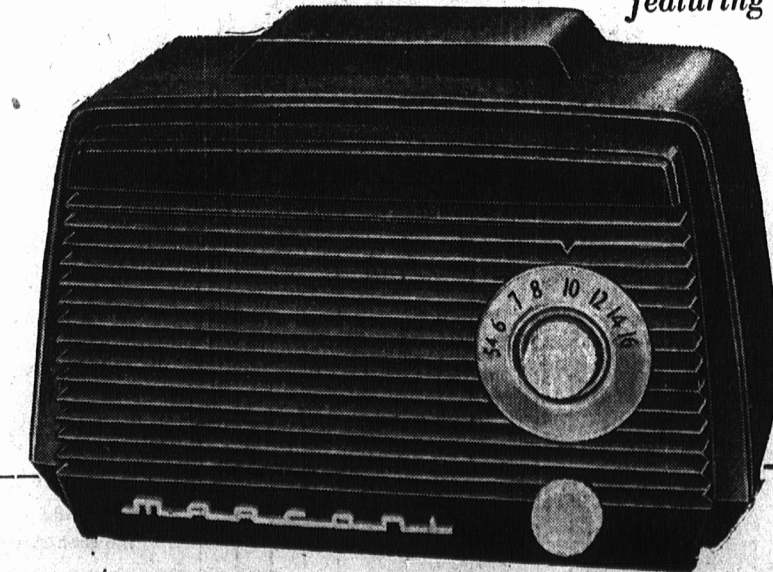

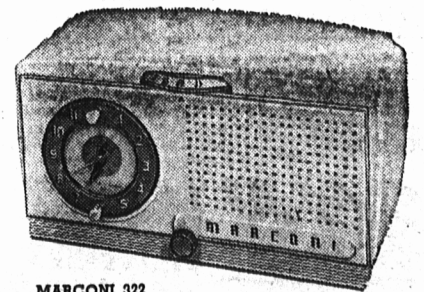
