Pearson Speech Tells Aims For Liberal Party

OTTAWA (CP)—Prime Minister Pearson called on the Liberal party to set its sights on relieving poverty, building opportunity and fostering national unity.

His address, at the closing banquet of the party's policy conference also asked party members to judge his political leadership on what he helped do to increase unity and well-being, not on day-to-day conflicts and controversies.

Mr. Pearson alluded only briefly to the economic policy controversy which marked the second day of the conference. He gave recognition to both sides by saying: "I hope we will get all the foreign capital we need and that we will need less and less as we develop."

He said alleviation of poverty and building of opportunity remain uncompleted national tasks. New emphasis was being given to planning and research in this field.

UNDERSTANDING NEEDED Relations between French- and English-speaking Canadians were a basic problem. Unless they were good, based on mutual understanding, tolerance and respect, there could not be unity in the country.

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Letters To Cabinet Minister Said Influencing Decisions

By DAVE McINTOSH OTTAWA (CP)—You, too, can take a hand in forming government policy. Write your favorite cabinet minister. The suggestion that the public can take a direct hand in shaping administration policy on specific issues comes from Prime Minister Pearson, Finance Minister Sharp and External Affairs Minister Martin.

For example: A special report for the government on the Nova Scotia coal industry recommends gradual abolition of federal subsidies and no new mine openings.

A year ago the government promised a new mine opening and \$25,000,000 aid for more mechanization.

On Oct. 12 Mr. Sharp told the Comr. on the government had been considering a statement on its coal policy to be issued at the same time as the report was made public.

Should Read Report He added: "Subsequent discussions led us to the conclusion that it would probably be better for all concerned if the public had an opportunity of reading the report before a statement on policy was made."

Does the government or the public make policy, demanded Robert Muir, Conservative MP for Cape Breton North and Victoria.

Mr. Pearson backed up Mr. Sharp: "The government announces the policy, but surely Mr. Muir will agree that the public should have the opportunity to make its views known on a matter of this importance when consideration is being given to it by the government."

PUBLIC NOT INTERESTED On several occasions Mr. Martin has said he favors Canada joining the Organization of American States but that the public isn't interested.

And he told the United Nations General Assembly Sept. 28 that Canada wants Communist China to be represented in the UN because Canadian public opinion is growing in favor of such action.

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Liberal Meeting Supports Sharp's Plan For Ownership

By DENNIS ORCHARD OTTAWA (CP)—Liberals concluded for Mitchell Sharp and against Walter Gordon last week with hardly a mention of the sacrifices both men would demand of Canada.

Their common goal is increased Canadian ownership of Canadian resources and business.

Finance Minister Sharp, acknowledged champ when the Liberal policy conference had made its choice, charts a path that emphasizes trade to do the job in the long run.

Mr. Gordon, his predecessor, has emphasized an expansion of savings by Canadians to buy back Canadian ownership and control.

In both cases a way must be found to reduce dependency on inflows of foreign capital, which totalled \$1,100,000,000 in 1965.

SAVINGS HIGH That represents 10 1/2 per cent of the total savings Canada needs to run its economy. The fact that Canada saved the other 89 1/2 per cent, or \$1,337,000,000 means that the country's rate of saving is already high.

To increase saving by even one per cent, Canadians would have to spend \$100,000,000 less. And to reduce foreign investment by whatever means without finding new savings to replace it, would be to invite financial crisis.

It would mean a balance of payments deficit, and many governments around the world are familiar with the cruel correctives that implies. They can take one of two harsh forms:

—Higher taxes and interest rates to reduce expenditures in the country;

—Devaluation of the currency or restrictions on imports.

INCREASE EXPORTS Mr. Sharp says efficient Canadian industries must give a whole new dimension to the economy by scoring in world markets with vastly increased exports. The emphasis is on high-margin manufactured goods, and Mr. Sharp has warned that manufacturers will

be steadily shorn of government protection.

Canada is a vigorous supporter of multilateral tariff reductions through Kennedy-round negotiations in Geneva. But if they do not succeed, it will pursue various free-trade agreements, industry by industry, with one or more countries.

The finance minister implies a small-scale shakeout, similar to the program under way in Britain, with the same promise of temporary unemployment in some sectors.

REDUCE DEFICIT The export capital so generated would eat into Canada's mammoth deficit on current transactions with the rest of the world. The deficit last year included more than \$1,000,000,000 in interest and dividend payments to foreigners, representing the bill for foreign investment in the past.

Montreal economist David Slater drew some implications from Mr. Gordon's kind of nationalism in a two-minute speech at the conference. It was packed with figures and drew little reaction from delegates, who were in a lather as the Gordon and Sharp groups traded attacks at a highly-emotional level.

The Gordon proposals would reduce foreign ownership and control of Canadian resources and business to one-third in 20 years. They would cut down the inflow of ownership capital, give preference to loan capital, and boost Canadian savings through new channels.

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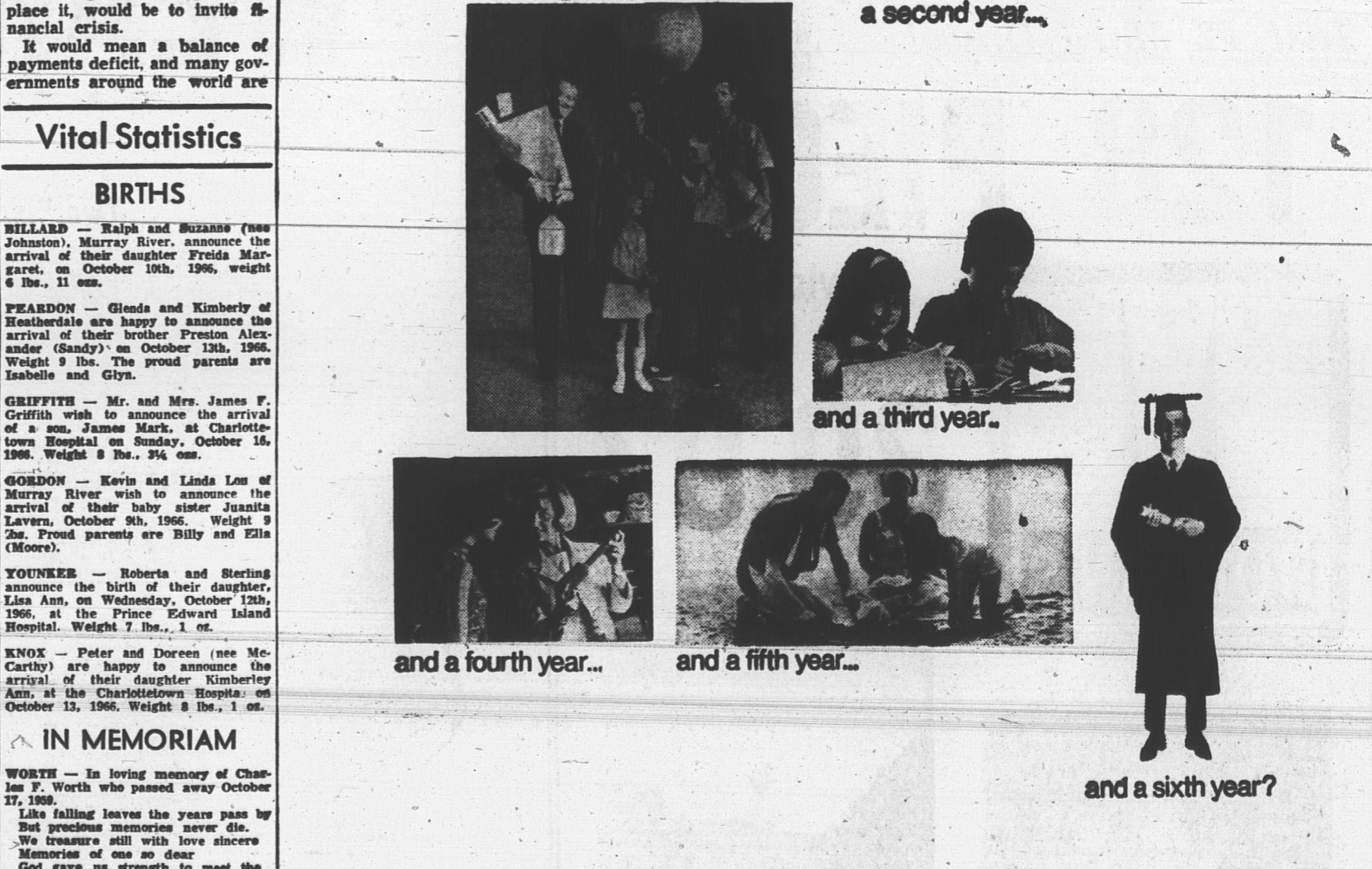
