ALARMING NEWS FROM CHINA

Telegraphed Direct to Emperor William by Count Waldersee.

BERLIN, Sept. 26.—Alarming news from China has reached the German Government, but it will not be published as Germany intends to use it during the conference in Peking. Field Marshal Count Von Waldersee has cabled to Emperor William direct that he has found the general situation more dangerous than he had expected. It was growing worse during each fortnight in Central and South China.

He says that the Boers prolonged the business, without seriously meaning to fight, for the one object of heaping up barrels of gold taken from the mines and of accumulating and hoarding them in obedience to the dictation of that old man Paul Kruger.

Coney, driven by El Gaylor, of Denver, went against time to beat the world's amateur racing record to-wagon, finishing the mile in 2.03, which is a half-second from Free Pond's record made in New York.

ENGLAND'S REPLY
