LATEST WAR NEWS.

British Troops Moving to the Front.

Arabi not Expected to Attack

Turkish Troops to Assist the English.

ALEXANDRIA, July 26. The best military authorities are of opinion that Arabi will not attack the British forces, although he daily continues to strengthen his position.

The British troops are rapidly moving heavy guns to the front, in anticipation of an early engagement.

The Porte has decided to send troops to Egypt to assist the British.

Omar Lufte has been appointed Minister of War, and successor to Arabi in the Egyptian Cabinet.

LATEST EUROPEAN NEWS.

A Supposed Murderer of Lord Cavendish Arrested.

CALLING OUT THE RESERVE.

DEATH OF A PRESIDENT.

LONDON, July 26. One of the supposed murderers of Lord Cavendish and Mr. Burke, has been arrested at St. Thomas, West Indies.

The Queen has sent a message to Parliament asking that first class Military Reserves be called out in all parts of the United Kingdom.

President Guardia, of Costa Rico, is dead.

GENERAL NEWS.

ALEXANDRIA, July 24. At five this morning, 3,000 Nubians with eight guns, marched to Aboukir under Abdallah Pacha, and began to construct earthworks.

LONDON, July 24. A Constantinople despatch says there is reason to believe Arabi has sent a species of illuminations to the Sultan, declaring that he is acting to save Islam from infidels and giving the Sultan notice that if the Porte sends troops to co-operate with un-believers, he will fight them and proclaim the Shercef of Mecca as Caliph.

It is understood that Earl Kimberley, Colonial Secretary, has accepted the Chancellorship of the Duchy of Lancaster, which was recently resigned by John Bright.

The News' despatch from Vienna says it is reported that the steamer "M. scow" has been sunk, by her boiler exploding, with 200 hands.

Another sparring match, under the same conditions as the last, has been arranged between Sullivan and Wilson for August 14th, at Madison Square Garden.

Hoskins has written to the English Consul at Cairo, urging him to impress upon British subjects the necessity of leaving Egypt at once.

The News' Rome despatch says it is stated in diplomatic circles that the Porte has sent circular letters to the powers, asking them to dissuade England from pushing on hostilities pending negotiations.

Schr. "Solomon Poole" arrived this morning from a Bank trip and reports the loss of one of the crew, John McIntyre, capsized and drowned on the bank while visiting trials. McIntyre is a native of Nova Scotia, unmarried.
