marching feet. Not the brutal noise of a drum on a boat, but rather the soft pitter-patter of moccasins, for it is natural to suppose that the dead march lighter than the living.

The good clergyman was fairly puzzled. He said naught to them. Had he been a good Catholic as he was good Protestant, he would no doubt have sung a mass for the souls in the cellar. The next legend, "The Tryon Light," is thrown into the dramatic form of a conversation between a fellow-dragsman of the iceboat between Capes Tormentine and Traverse, and a middle-aged passenger, with a faraway look in his eyes as if he wrote editorials for a newspaper:

"Passenger—I think, sir, you belong to this coast. Can you give me any information respecting a strange light that is sometimes seen on Tryon bar?"

Mariner—(J. B.) My name is Bouncer. Jim B. uncer.

Pass—Pardon me, Mr. Bouncer, I am really much interested in the matter from a scientific point of view. Have you ever seen the light yourself?"

J. B. Maybe I have and maybe I haven't. It ain't a thing to speak of.

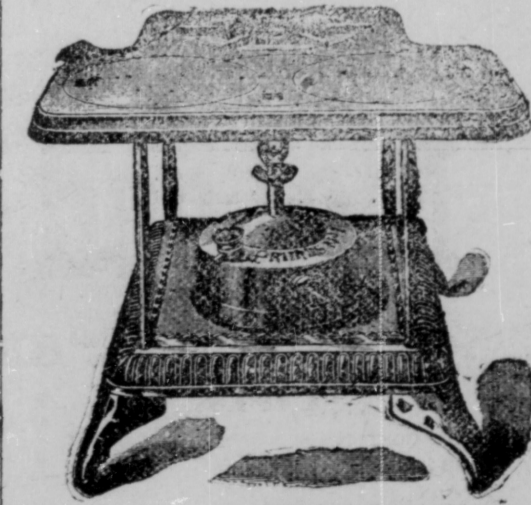
