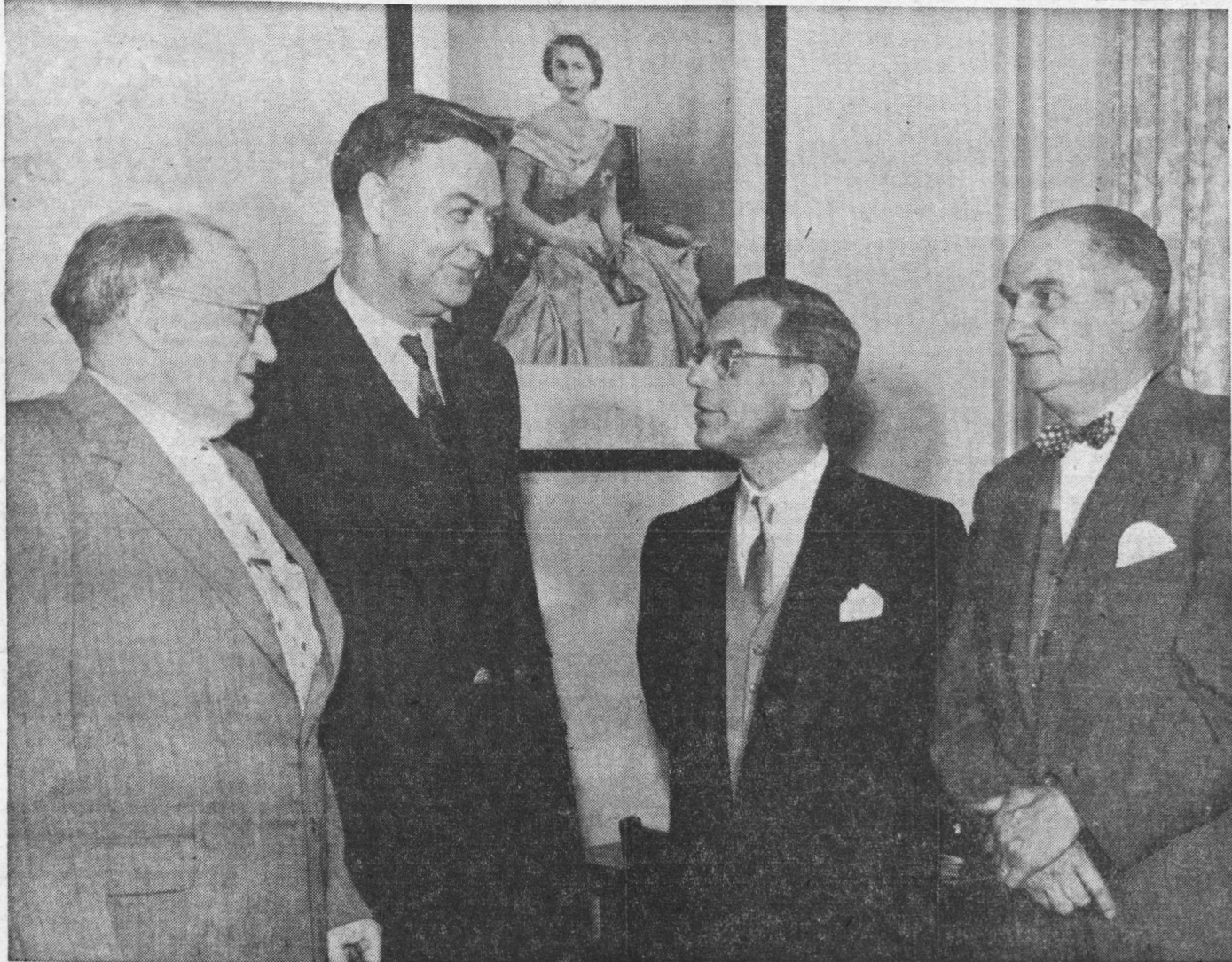

## Summit Conference Nearer But Snags Still In Way

LONDON (AP) — Russia and the West seem agreed on most of the steps toward a summit conference—but a lot of snags are holding up a decision of the date.

Here is Friday night's lineup of the differing Soviet and Western positions:

**A Meeting In Moscow:** Both sides want one later this month. Russia would confine the discussions only to fixing time, place and composition of a foreign minister's meeting not later than mid-May. The West wants the talks to include political issues including an agenda for the government chiefs.

**Foreign Ministers' Conference:** Both sides are ready to arrange one soon. Russia says the ministers' task should be only to fix time, place and membership of the summit conference. The West insists the ministers also should define possible areas of agreement at the summit, which means power to negotiate.

**The Summit Meeting Itself:** Both sides say they want it to ease world tensions. The Russians demand the conference be held even if preliminary talks fail. The West insists it would be wrong to hold summit talks only for propaganda—they must offer hope of good results.

**Place and Time of Summit Conference:** Russia says it is ready to hold one anywhere convenient to President Eisenhower, including the United States. The West says Geneva in neutral Switzerland will do. Canada and Sweden also have been suggested. Russia would like the meeting in the summer. The West thinks an October conference, if all goes well, is the earliest they could manage.

**Composition of Summit Conference:** Russia wants as many Communist as Western nations,

plus some described as neutrals. The West would like to confine it to the big four, but would accept certain neutrals.

**Jury Finds Killing Lana's Boyfriend Was Justifiable**  
LOS ANGELES (AP) — "He said he would kill me and my daughter and my mother," Lana Turner sobbed Friday to a coroner's jury which later decided her daughter's killing of Johnny Stompanato was justifiable.

**LETTERS TO THE EDITOR**  
The address declared her last words to Stompanato were: "Don't ever touch me again! I'm absolutely finished. This is the end and I want you to get out!" Then, the blonde star said, her daughter Cheryl slipped a kitchen knife into Stompanato's stomach and "I swear it was so fast I truthfully thought she had hit him in the stomach."

**GAME ACT**  
Amendments to the game act will make it tougher on visiting hunters who are caught without a license. A non-resident license costs \$35 and the fine was formerly \$10. The amendment now calls for a fine of not less \$50 and not more than \$150. Court costs have been increased from \$5 to \$10. A prison term of 30 days awaits anyone who does not pay the fine.

After hearing more than an hour of her tremulous testimony, the jury of 10 men and two women decided 14-year-old Cheryl's slaying of her mother's lover was justifiable homicide.

The verdict is not binding on the courts, however. Cheryl, who has been at Juvenile Hall since the slaying last Friday night, will learn her future at a juvenile court hearing April 24. She could go free, be made a ward of the court, sent to a foster home, or placed in the custody of her mother or father. The latter is Stephen Crane, second of Miss Turner's four husbands.

## Would Scrap Means Test For Disability Pensions

Fred Ramsay (Liberal 1st. Prince) urged in the Legislature Thursday that the means test be eliminated for those receiving disability pensions. He said most disabled persons were in far worse financial straits than a healthy robust person over 70 who receives the pension with no means test.

As a case in question Mr. Ramsay referred to a man in his own district who he said had both his legs off at the thigh. His wife who is a school teacher has to earn the living for the family but be-

cause of the means test, this man cannot qualify for a disability pension.

Mr. Ramsay stressed the importance of a farm credit policy which would be more realistic to the farmers of Prince Edward Island than that offered by the Canadian Farm Loan Board. He said the policy of the latter was designed more for the bigger and wealthier farmers of other parts of Canada.

## Legislature To Prorogue Today

His Honor, Lieutenant-Governor F. Walter Hyndman will prorogue the Third Session of the 48th General Assembly of the Province of Prince Edward Island at noon today.

Traditional ceremonies will be carried out, the Guard of Honor or being provided by the P. E. I. Regiment (17 Recce.).

The House went into committee on the estimates shortly after 9 o'clock last night and were still in session at an early hour this morning.

In addition several items of legislation still require third reading prior to the move for prorogation.

Estimates totalling \$16,028,870 are expected to receive approval.

## TELLS OF GRANT SPLIT

## Nfld. Is Our Best Friend Premier Tells Legislature

Premier Matheson said last night in the Legislature that the Newfoundland delegates at the Halifax meeting were the first to come to the aid of the Island and while amounts of 1.7 million dollars were suggested by officials of the Finance Department at Ottawa, it was the Newfoundland boys who suggested the 30-30-30 split that gave Prince Edward Island its two and a half million dollars.

The Premier took a hefty swing at what he termed "a bunch of bureaucrats" in the Department of Finance at Ottawa. He said the same civil servants in that department are in evidence under the present Government as were present during the St. Laurent regime.

**HALIFAX MEETING**  
He made reference to notes taken at Halifax meeting. From these it was noted that Dr. Taylor from the Federal Department of Finance made a statement to the effect that under the formula, Prince Edward

Island should get 1.7 million and observed. "That is more than they deserve."

"I hope the new Prime Minister will tell these fellows where they should go, and I am sure everyone in this House tonight would not be long suggesting that place," said the Premier.

Referring to the criticism made by Dr. Dewar to the effect that Premier Smallwood had "taken the other Provinces for a ride" the Premier said nothing could be further from the truth. "No one was fooled. I have been attending these conferences for years and that is not the way we work. We have had several meetings of the Atlantic Provinces' Premiers and there have always been the best of relations existing between us," he said.

## Two Federal Contracts Let

OTTAWA — Two contracts totalling about \$28,000 for improvements to wharf at Vernon River and to the lighting system on the Railway Wharf at Charlottetown were announced Friday by the Public Works Department.

The contract for the wharf extension at Vernon River, amounting to \$16,978 was awarded to Edward MacCallum, of Brackley Beach, P. E. I. His tender was the lowest of four received.

The one for improvements on the lighting system of the Railway Wharf at Charlottetown went to Chappell and Co., of Charlottetown, and is for \$5,250.

The work on the Vernon River wharf, to be completed by next December 15, calls for an L-shaped extension to be composed of two arms. One of these will be 112 by 12 feet and the other 26 by 62 feet.

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## Sharp Debate On Estimates

Increases in members' salaries served as the spark between Hon. Douglas MacKinnon and Leo Rossiter as the closing session of the Legislature wore into the early hours of this morning.

Dr. L. G. Dewar moved that the expense item of \$9,450 be deleted from the estimates.

Before the heated argument "cooled down" the Premier, George Saville, William Acorn and R. R. Bell took part.

The motion was defeated in the resulting vote.

## Fishermen Not Concerned With Limits, Want Equality

HALIFAX (CP) — Fisheries Council of Canada manager Gordon O'Brien said here Friday the council is not concerned if the fishing limit off Canada is three or 12 miles, as long as it is equal for all countries.

"We resent the fact that waters off our shore are restricted to our own boats," he said. "We feel that whatever the limit, let it be the same for Canadians as others. At present there is a nine-mile bank offshore where Canadian boats cannot fish while others can."

Canadian boats more than 65 feet long are not allowed to fish within 12 miles of shore by Canadian law, while foreign boats can fish within three miles of the coast.

Both the Canadian and United States government are in favor of Canada having fishing jurisdiction up to 12 miles off shore, he said. The fishing limit is likely to be a major topic of debate at the Fisheries Council of Canada annual meeting here next Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

About 350 delegates from all provinces except Alberta are expected to attend the convention. It is the first time the convention has been held here.

Fisheries Minister MacLean, council president O. J. McDonald and Nova Scotia Premier Stanfield are scheduled to speak to the convention Monday.

## Eight Inches Of Snow In The U. S.

CHICAGO (AP) — A spring storm smacked parts of the northeastern United States with up to eight inches of wet snow Friday.

A sloppy blanket built up from northern Ohio eastward across northern New Jersey and lower New York and northward into New England.

Official measurements of 3.7 inches of snow at Hillsgrove airport, Rhode Island, broke a 53-year local record for snowfall so late in the season. Some points in southern New England reported eight inches.

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## Details Of Itinerary Are Being Worked Out Now

OTTAWA (CP)—Princess Margaret's month-long visit to Canada this summer will take her from coast to coast, with stops in at least 12 cities, it was announced Friday.

The first two weeks are to be spent in British Columbia, where she will share in the province's centennial celebrations, centred on Vancouver and Victoria. Then the princess is to visit the Banff and Prince Albert National Parks, and the cities of Calgary, Toronto, Niagara Falls, Hamilton, Stratford, Ont., Ottawa, Montreal, Quebec, Fredericton and Halifax.

(Contacted last night government sources were unable to say whether or not this Province would be included in the itinerary planned for Her Royal Highness. Neither the Lieutenant-Governor, Hon. F.W. Hyndman, nor the Government of the Province have been informed officially of the forthcoming visit, officials stated.)

Margaret is to spend July 12 to 26 in Vancouver. It is understood she will fly there from England with only refueling stops en route. The announcement did not disclose how she will travel in Canada, but the itinerary and time allotments indicated it likely will be by plane and train.

Officials said full details will be available only when the completed arrangements have been approved by the Princess.

The prime minister's office said in a statement that program details now are being worked out with provincial and municipal authorities.

Margaret's 15-day itinerary, following the completion of her B.C. engagements, is being planned to give her about the same amount of time in each of three major areas—the West, the central provinces and the Atlantic region.

**ALLOTTED DATES**  
Dates allotted for the respective areas are: The West, July 26-30; central provinces, July 31-Aug. 5, including two days in Ottawa; the Atlantic region, Aug. 6-10.

Mr. Diefenbaker's office, announcing that Margaret has approved the outline itinerary for her trip, said it is being planned so that her schedule will not become too heavy and yet give her "a general glimpse of Canada, both urban and rural, at work and play in the summer."

The stop at Stratford is to enable Margaret to attend the Stratford Shakespeare Festival.

Reports from the festival centre said she will attend a command performance of Shakespeare's romantic drama, "The Merchant of Venice."

**Cannot Afford Wage Increase**  
LONDON (Reuters) — Britain's railroad workers, brooding over a possible country-wide strike were told Friday night that the state-owned but financially embarrassed lines cannot afford wage increases estimated at £30,000,000 a year.

**INVITE THE DUKE**  
It also was reported from Stratford that orchestra leader-composer Duke Ellington, not originally scheduled to perform in the Stratford musical festival this year, was being invited for the occasion and that Margaret would attend a jazz concert by his ensemble.

The statement said Mr. Diefenbaker is sure "that all Canadians will share my pleasure that Her Royal Highness is able to come to Canada this summer."

"I know it would be the desire of all provinces to have the opportunity of extending a warmly affectionate and enthusiastic welcome," said the prime minister, holidaying in Bermuda. "However, the distances involved and the length of the visit have placed strict limitations upon what could be done."

It will be Margaret's first trip to Canada, apart from a brief stop at Montreal's Dorval Airport Jan. 31, 1955, en route to Trinidad. But she has always wanted to visit the country, and has remarked ruefully that she will be one of the last members of her family to do so.

In 1956, the wish became reality when the committee in charge of the B.C. centennial observations extended her an invitation. The festivities are to mark 100 years of progress since B.C. was created a Crown colony in 1858.

**STANFIELD DELIGHTED**  
HALIFAX (CP) — Premier Stanfield said Friday night he is "delighted" that Princess Margaret will be visiting Nova Scotia during a tour of the Atlantic provinces Aug. 6-10.

He said the government received official word Friday of the Princess' visit. "Of course, the message was confidential," he said. "We are very delighted to have her come to our province."

**N. B. PLEASED**  
FREDERICTON (CP) — Premier Fleming and Mayor W.T. Walker of Fredericton both expressed pleasure Friday night at the announcement that Princess Margaret would visit the province's capital in August.

Premier Fleming said details of the New Brunswick visit have not yet been worked out.

"We have no idea what her itinerary will be in the province, but we will try to have her visit as many of the larger centres as possible," Mr. Fleming said. "There have been no negotiations on that at all as yet. We expect to hear from the office of the secretary of state."

"It is wonderful news," said Mayor Walker. "I am sure that the citizens of Fredericton will go all out to give her a royal welcome."

He added that as soon as details of the visit were known a special meeting of city council would be called to plan the city's share of the program.

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
