Lions Official Visits Local Club
"The air is tense in the Far East and suspense reigns supreme," said Bruce M. Leyden of Calgary, Alta., vice-president of Lions International at speaking before the local club at their weekly supper meeting at the Queen Hotel last evening.
Mr. Leyden, who has just returned from a 30,000 mile good-will tour of the Far East, dwelt at length on his experiences during his trip which lasted three months and during which time he addressed more than ten thousand persons at meetings in Japan, Australia and many Isles of the Pacific.
"Recent developments in Indo-China and Australia indicate this area as one of the most important in the world," the speaker said.
"Communism has grown in eight years from 200 million to 900 million and is on the march to overrun the world. If there was ever a time in history that we remain strong, it is now, in order to avoid their power to evaporate our Canadian way of life," the speaker said.
SAYS OVER COMPLACENT
"Canada is over complacent because we have; and millions have not," he said. "Golden Goodness is rotting in our grain storage while millions of little bellies are never filled, which is a damnable situation. We must not let those people down," the speaker continued. "A few hundred thousand bushels of grain can help stand off the hordes of the Communists. We must match wits with them—they are out to get us."
The speaker was convinced that Burma and India are on the fence waiting to see how the wind blows in the fierce and terrible struggle which the powerful and ruthless Communists are waging for world domination.
