## THE PROHIBITION BILL.

NATIONAL PROHIBITION—for which the great majority voted in the Plebiscite—has been shelved by the perfidious Government which rules at Ottawa; and Provincial Prohibition, which no one voted for, is to be enacted. National Prohibition could, without a doubt, be enacted and enforced, under our constitution, by the Dominion Parliament and Government; there remains a grave doubt that Provincial Prohibition can be so constitutionally enacted and enforced. From the enactment and enforcement of National Prohibition we might expect good results—leading on, perhaps, to Continental Prohibition; from Provincial Prohibition, nothing more than the Canada-Temperance Act has given and will give! Yet our temperance leaders propose to overlook the deceit and fraud of the Government which, in flagrant disregard of promises and expectations made and held out, has refused to act according to the result of the plebiscite, and to accept Provincial Prohibition. Well, it's their business; and we can only regret that their sincerity has been so deeply compromised.

Concerning the bill now before the Legislature, we have little to say. It seems to be the Manitoba Bill applied to Prince Edward Island and it provides that the sale of intoxicating liquors shall not be legal here,—except for sacramental, medicinal and mechanical purposes. There is not a word in the bill about the importation or manufacture of intoxicants; for the importation and manufacture cannot be prohibited by the Province! Whether the Provincial authorities can stop the sale is a doubtful point; and the law must needs, after its enactment, run the gauntlet of the courts.

The penalties attached to the infringement of the proposed law are higher than those imposed by the Scott Act. For the first offence there is a fine of \$100 or three months imprisonment; for the second offence, a fine of \$200 or four months imprisonment; and for the third offence, six months imprisonment. In this respect the bill is, perhaps, an improvement upon the Canada Temperance Act. In every other respect it is a distinctly inferior measure.

By far the most notable and significant provision of the bill is the last which is evidently, of local manufacture. It reads:

This Act shall come into force on the fifth day of June, A. D., 1901, but shall not apply or take effect in those portions of this province in which the second part of "The Canada Temperance Act" is in force; provided nevertheless that should the Order in Council by which the second part of "The Canada Temperance Act" is brought into force in any county or counties of this Province be at any time hereafter revoked, then this act shall immediately on such revocation come into force and take effect in such county or counties to which such revocation shall apply.

That is to say, Premier Farquharson is to have the use of "the blood money" for a whole year—and liquor is to be sold as heretofore for several months after the next session of the legislature ought to be—and probably will be—held! This is a device worthy of the gentlemen who beguiled Piquet.

Another point to be noted is that after all the fuss about Provincial Prohibition the bill is practically applicable, not to the Province, but to Charlottetown alone—whether Charlottetown will sit or rot! *Vive la bagatelle! Succes to humbug*

## SCOTT ACT PROSECUTION.

ACCORDING to a return asked for by Mr. Birch under the head of Crown Prosecutions, the sum of \$428.74 was paid out last year for Scott Act prosecutions. Another return asked for by Mr. McKinnon and laid upon the table of the House, concerning three Stipendiary Magistrates, shows that not one dollar has been returned to the Treasury. These gentlemen receive a salary of \$200 each, a total of \$600. There are also three Prosecutors who get yearly \$200 each, another total of \$600. These sums, together with the \$428.74 paid out as expenses, make a grand total of \$1,628.74. And there is not a dollar from the Stipendiary Magistrates.

## A NEW PROCEEDING.

On Thursday afternoon, Mr. A. A. McLean submitted a bill to the House to amend the act respecting representation in the Legislature. The amendment provided that no person "not a resident of the Province shall be eligible as a member of the Legislative Assembly."

It has always been the practice in our House to permit bills to be received and read a first time without remark or explanation the part of the mover. But it did not suit our incapable Government to permit a just measure like this to be read, and the Premier insisted that explanation be made by Mr. McLean. After the explanation the motion to receive and read the bill was put by the Speaker,—but it was voted down by the Pineau faction.

## NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—It has been remarked that Oom Paul should not be hard to catch. He is weighted down with more bags of gold than with either years or sorrow, and his "better half" is already in the hands of the enemy!

—A correspondent of the London Times says that Colonel Sam Hughes is proving himself an ideal leader of irregular mounted forces.

—Lord Roberts recommends that the Canadian Mounted Rifles be christened anew, and suggests that they be called the Royal Canadian Dragoons. By all means, says the Mail and Empire, and the regiment will always affectionately regard the field marshal as its god-father.

—The St. John Sun remarks that the Grit papers are indulging in vain imaginings about "what Birmingham could tell," while they are eloquently silent about what Col. Pritchett and other tools of the machine have told! Why this reticence?

—At the annual meeting of the Bank of Montreal on Monday last, the general manager, Mr. Clouston, referred to the general prosperity of Canada in these terms: "Canada has good reason to be well satisfied with the results of business

for the last twelve months. From every province of the Dominion, with the exception of British Columbia, come reports of universal prosperity, active trade, good crops, and, generally speaking, satisfactory prices. The lumber trade never was in better condition; while the dairy exports have only been limited by the extent of the cold storage accommodation, which is still insufficient for the growing wants of the trade. Railroad earnings were the largest in the history of Canada." Having thus dealt with the past, Mr. Clouston had a word of prudent counsel as to the future. He said: "For the coming year there are some indications of over-production. Stocks in the merchant's hands are too large, and in some districts collections are disappointing. In fact, at the moment there is something of a check, which, however, may prove highly salutary, if the commercial community will only proceed with caution till the new crop is assured and matters have adjusted themselves on a more satisfactory basis."
