

# Not Satisfied British Conservative Party Strong

LONDON (CP)—Oliver Poole is preparing himself and the Conservative party for their first joint action since he confidently lowered himself into the party chairman's seat.

Four by-elections—three of them for socialist-held seats—are coming up shortly to test the Tory party organization inherited by Poole from his 72-year-old predecessor, Lord Woolton.

But Poole, a lanky leader with a bland, chubby face, isn't overly satisfied with the party machine, and says so in public.

**ENERGETIC ENTHUSIASM**  
"The fact is," he says with characteristic candor, "it isn't anything like as good as it is made out to be."  
With this as his starting point, Poole is tackling his new task with energetic enthusiasm. He plans quick trips to constituencies to strengthen any weak spots, but has no violent changes in mind.

"We believe that basically our organization is on the right lines." But he adds no election is ever won "simply by organization."  
His remarks were made at a meeting with political correspondents. By way of introduction, Poole told the newspaper men he had neither the temperament nor the opportunity to make headlines.

## IN MEMORIAM

**REV. A. W. MCINTYRE**  
The parishioners of Grand River were saddened when the word was received that Rev. Father Alexander Wilfred McIntyre had passed away at the Misericordia Hospital in Winnipeg on November 13th, at the early age of sixty-four.

Father Alex as he was more familiarly known to all who had the pleasure of knowing him was the son of the late James A. McIntyre and Mary McDonald of East Point and was born in Arlington Lot 14 in 1871. Later the family moved to Grand River where he spent most of his boyhood days and where in July 18, 1920, he was ordained to the Holy Priesthood by Bishop H. J. O'Leary in St. Patrick's Church, Grand River.

Following his ordination, he went to Winnipeg and was appointed to his first parish in Oct. 1920 at Delaraine, Manitoba. In 1931 he went to Virdean and in 1934 he took over the parish duties of Souris, Man. where he worked long and hard for his parishioners for in those days he had to use all sorts of transportation to get to his out-post missions.

In 1944 he was appointed pastor of St. Viator's Church in Dauphin, Manitoba where he will be remembered for his many radio talks. He served there until his retirement in 1951. Following his retirement his health improved sufficiently for him to become assistant priest at the Immaculate Conception Church in Winnipeg a position he held until a heart attack forced him to retire to St. Joseph's Home where he spent the past two years.

He was visited in his last remaining hours by his Archbishop Pocock.

The following are left to mourn the loss of a loving brother, one sister, Mrs. Alexander Cummings, Grand River; two brothers, James, Repokline, Mass., Herman in Bay-side; a brother, Wallace and a sister, Imelda, having predeceased him many years ago.

Pontifical Requiem High Mass was sung at 10 a.m. Wednesday in St. Mary's Cathedral, Archbishop F. F. Pocock officiating; burial was in St. Mary's Cemetery.
