GOTHENBURG, Sweden, July 17 (AP)—Jakob Malik, Soviet delegate to the United Nations, said on his arrival here today that "we have always worked to preserve peace." It was Malik's only statement to the press.

Malik, who brought up the Korean cease-fire proposal in a speech from New York three weeks ago, is on his way to Moscow with his family for a vacation.

The Soviet diplomat declined to say when he expects to return to the United States.

Junior Club Work With W. I. Branch

The following report, which covers the wide range of new projects undertaken by the Women's Institute Branch on the Island, was given by Assistant Supervisor, Miss Boswell, at the recent W. I. Convention.

"I would like to say that this work has expanded beyond our greatest dreams, and I for one have enjoyed every minute of it. I appreciate the co-operation of members and leaders, and the spirit of enthusiasm which was prevalent in their work of 1950.

It would be difficult not to enter wholeheartedly into work such as this when one realizes the importance of youth training.

During the summer months three District Achievement Days were held. One at Alliston in connection with the Illustration Field Day put on by the Experimental Farm. This was quite successful with a large attendance.

During the afternoon while the work was being judged, the girls took part in sports and enjoyed films in the evening. The District Achievement Day for the western end of the Island was held in O'Leary with another good attendance. While work was being judged, Miss Audrey MacMillan led the girls in games and sports. At the closing of the afternoon, a nice picnic lunch was served.

The District Achievement Day for Prince County was held in conjunction with the Junior Farmers' Field Day held at Upton Farm, and we do appreciate the opportunity given to us to hold our different club gatherings at the time of Field Days on the ground of the Experimental Farm. The day proved very successful with an excellent attendance.

During the latter part of July we held our first Short Course for all Food and Clothing Club Girls between the ages of 16-21 at the Vocational School. Twenty-four girls took this course. Eleven entered in Food and thirteen in Clothing. Instruction was given by Miss Robin, Miss MacMillan and myself. Speakers during the course included Miss Marjorie Hill, Teacher of Home Economics at Prince of Wales College; Miss Dorothy Cox, Public Health Nurse, and Mr. Stewart Wright, Department of Agriculture.

Elimination Exams were held the final day to choose the winning teams to represent the Island at the Dominion Competition. Judges were Miss Marjorie Hill and Mrs. William Reddin. This was the first year we had a sufficient number of Food Clubs to enter a team in the Food Project.

During the past year I have prepared and given 10 Junior Farm Club Broadcasts on various topics of interest to Club Girls. I have also assisted with a number of regular weekly Women's Institute Broadcasts.

Last summer Miss Audrey MacMillan joined our staff and proved of great assistance in both the Girls' Club and Institute work. Miss MacMillan has joined our staff for the summer months and we are very pleased to have her with us.

Last fall we organized 75 Sewing Clubs and during the winter months, 8 Food Clubs. Miss Robin and I instructed in 74 of these and we were very fortunate to have our club at Southport instructed by two local leaders — Mrs. Neil Matheson, Mrs. Wellner.

In March, I accompanied our Food and Clothing Club team to National Boys' and Girls' Club the Dominion Competition of the Contest.

We helped with the Junior Farmers' Short Course held at Prince of Wales College last January.

By way of keeping in touch with the Clubs, circular letters were prepared and sent out at intervals during the winter months.

In March, I represented Prince Edward Island at the Annual Meeting of the Canadian Council of Boys and Girls Club Work. And also attended the Canadian Agricultural Extension Association Annual meeting at the University of Manitoba.

I consider it a great privilege to have been able to sit in on these meetings and benefit by the very valuable discussions which took place there. This exchanging of views and ideas with the east, west and central Canada certainly has a broadening effect on our work, and helps to promote unity and extend our line of vision.

During the spring months we have visited each of our 76 Sewing Clubs and Local Achievement Days have been held for 61 of these. The work in most cases shows a great improvement.

A new project in Junior Club work was started this spring — Garden Clubs. Four of these have been started in Unionvale, Alexandria, North Rustico, and New Zealand. We have visited these gardens and find them all progressing favorably.

I have attended twenty-one W. I. District Conventions and given addresses at fourteen of these.

We wish to express our thanks to the Girls Sewing Clubs Local leaders for the time effort and interest they have shown in these Clubs.

I would like to join with Miss Robin in expressing my thanks for the co-operation received from the different members of the Department of Agriculture, the Provincial Women's Institute Executive, as well as officials from the Experimental Farm for their courtesy, help and consideration during the past year. It has resulted in a united effort, and convinced us of the truth in the saying "In Unity is Strength."

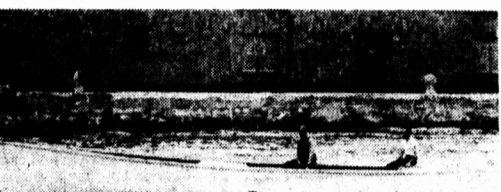

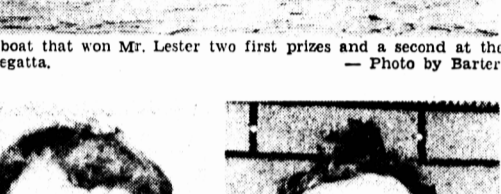

The boat that won Mr. Lester two first prizes and a second at the Souris Regatta. —Photo by Barter.



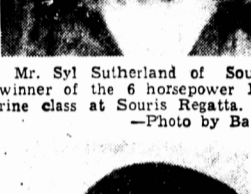

P.E.I. Presbytery Summer Meeting

The Presbytery of P. E. I. held its summer meeting at Camp Keir at Souris River on July 12th, with the Moderator, the Rev'd. D. A. Campbell in the chair, and the Clerk, the Rev'd. T. H. B. Somers at the desk.

The following additional members were present: Rev. G. C. Webster, Rev. F. N. Young, Rev. G. B. Cunningham, Rev. Donald Nicholson, Ministers; Mr. Fred Clark, Mr. D. A. MacKinnon, Mr. Angus Green, Mr. W. E. Forbes and Mr. Everett Hardy, Elders. The Rev'd. J. V. Crawford, Stated Supply at Marshfield, was welcomed to the Court as were T. T. Cunningham, S. D. Self and Hugh Nugent, Students appointed to work in the Presbytery for the summer months.

The first act of the Court was a commemoration of the life and ministry of the Very Reverend Frank Baird, M.A., D.D., LL.D., former Moderator of the General Assembly and Clerk of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces who entered into rest on June 22nd. A motion of record was moved by the Rev. G. C. Webster, seconded by the Rev. T. H. B. Somers and assented to by a standing vote whereupon the Moderator offered prayers of thanksgiving. Correspondence included a report on the repairs made at the request of the Presbytery to the grave of the pioneer minister, the Rev'd. Peter Gordon by the Kirk Session of Mount Stewart. The Clerk read the minutes of Congregational Meetings for the purposes of incorporating Boards of Trustees under the Act of 1933 for the following congregations:

Reporting on the disposal of the Dundas property the convener, Mr. Webster, stated the transfer of deeds would soon be complete. Reports on the recent General Assembly held in Ottawa in June were given by Rev. G. C. Webster, Rev. G. B. Cunningham and Mr. D. A. MacKinnon all of whom spoke of the encouraging achievements and the fine spirit that prevailed in the deliberations of the supreme court of the Church.

Upon the resumption of business after the noon recess the Clerk presented the first documents relative to the forthcoming "Christian Outreach Campaign" which will be launched in the Fall to obtain approximately \$1,000,000 for Church extension. The Rev. T. H. B. Somers has been appointed by the Assembly to represent the Presbytery on the National Campaign Council which will hold its first meetings in Toronto on September 5th and 6th. At the recent Assembly Mr. Somers was also appointed to the Board of Administration for a period of three years. Following the meeting of the National Council the Presbytery will hold a special meeting on September 11th to consider plans for the "Outreach" campaign. On motion of the Clerk the Court accepted the allocation of \$15,790 allotted by the Assembly.
