S'side High School Has Many Facilities

Mr. Clarence Mercer, supervisor of the Summerside High School, in a recent report to the Board of School Trustees, disclosed that capital equipment to a value in excess of \$16,000 has been provided for the High School by voluntary contributions and government agencies in the last five years.

Mr. Mercer was appreciative of the keen interest displayed in the welfare of the school by service organizations and individuals, and pointed out that the interest people had taken in their school is shown by the magnificent contributions that have been made.

The Summerside Y's Men's Club to whom the main credit must be given for commencing manual training, has made this training possible through their donation of \$1500.00. The Y's Men have also placed bicycle racks on the school grounds at an estimated cost of \$200.00. This Summer-side club has installed a new refrigerator in the home economics department at the school at an approximate cost of \$400.00.

The Summerside Kinsmen Club at a cost of some \$1600.00 has installed a modern public address system in the school which has thirty outlets to the various classrooms.

The Summerside Rotary Club, in addition to sponsoring and equipping a sixteen-man safety patrol has provided also \$1000.00 to encourage mechanical training. The safety patrol is composed of selected students and members of this patrol are always on duty in the immediate school area, guiding the children across the street intersections during the hours they are coming from and going to school. This safety patrol has had excellent training, take their responsibility seriously and are doing an exceptionally fine job.

The Home and School Welfare Group has donated \$1000.00 for kitchen equipment for the home economics department and the purchase of a second piano for the school music department.

The I.O.D.E. has purchased a substantial number of books for the general library and for the home economics department.

Students Council Active. The Students Council of the school, during the past five years has provided equipment for the school to a value in excess of \$100.00 which is raised chiefly through the sale of their school magazine and two or three social dances through the year in their auditorium. Equipment provided by the Student Council includes an electric clock and an automatic bell attachments which ring in the elementary school and high school to indicate the beginning and ending of classes. They have also provided some late models of projection and recording equipment which is used extensively for instructional purposes.

The teaching staff has also provided considerable equipment in the school and have made substantial additions to the school facilities chiefly through the efforts of their various student programmes.

The contributions made to the High School by individuals is too extensive to enumerate here but they range all the way from a set of Encyclopaedia Britannica for the library to electric motors for the workshop.

Diversity of Training. With the assistance that has been received from organizations and individuals coupled with the devotion, determination and resourcefulness of the supervisor, Summerside High School has advanced to a point where it can now offer an amazing diversity of training and education, and in addition to the usual grade and high school subjects, the students can also receive commercial training, manual training, wood work, metal work, acetylene welding and for the girls there are excellent facilities for home economics training.

A wonderful spirit of sincere interest and co-operation prevails in this school among the teachers, students and parents and a visit through the school is convincing proof of the excellent training and facilities which exist there and which should make this school second to none in the Maritimes.

Let's Talk It Over

A Prince County Viewpoint by "d"

It was interesting to note that Mayor Henry Wedge of Summerside is interested in having the mineral element, fluorine, added to the town's drinking water. From what we have read, we should say this would indeed be a progressive step to take. An interesting difference was observed between two cities, North Shields and South Shields, in England. The water supply of North Shields contained less than 25 parts per million of fluorine, but in South Shields the water contained 14 parts per million. The difference in the teeth of the children of the two cities was remarkable. A test examination of the 12-year olds in each city showed that the North Shields children had twice as much dental caries as the South Shields children. If the process of fluorination is not expensive, as His Worship implies, then we should certainly lose no time in carrying this health measure into effect.

A writer in commenting on the impending strike of the Sydney school teachers implied that people of intelligence never strike. While it is true that some strikes are even for a righteous cause, are called without exhausting all other means of possible settlement, and that other strikes don't ever have a just cause to justify them, still it is rather a sweeping assertion which implies that strikes are always wrong. After all, we got Magna Carta as the result of a strike. Against a king, at that. Planes Leave On Tour of U. S. Bases Jan. 20

The Northern Cross, and the Zenith, two famous aircraft, are expected to leave their home base at the R.C.A.F. Station in Summerside, at 10 a.m. on January 20th, for their annual tour of inspection of United States Air Force bases.

While away from Summerside they will visit United States air stations in Maryland, North Carolina, Florida and Texas.

The purpose of the trip is to give students and staff an appreciation of U. S. Air Force navigational methods and problems.

This flight, which is expected to return to the Summerside base on February 8th, is under the command of Wing Commander H. A. Forbes, D.F.C.

His second-in-command is S/L R. H. Blackmore, who is an R. A. F. exchange officer.

On each such course there is an American officer, and in this course he is Major J. R. McGill.

The crew of the aircraft Northern Cross will be, Captain, S/L J. C. R. Brown, D.F.C.; co-pilot, F/L K. E. Lussier, D.F.C.; radio officer, F/O C. R. Foster; the crewmen, Sgt. W. Trimbee, and Corporal D. L. Talbot.

The crew of the aircraft Zenith will be, Captain, F/O D. D. Chapman; co-pilot, F/O J. Finkbeiner; radio officer, F/O W. H. MacLeod; the crewmen, Sgt. C. B. Stevenson, and Corporal E. L. Bagnall.

Shortly after their return in February, they will visit Bermuda, and in March they fly to the United Kingdom to visit R.A.F. navigational centers, and also to practice navigational techniques.

Late in April they will go to the Arctic, where they will fly over the North Magnet Pole to observe the effects of the magnetic pole upon their equipment, and also to practice Arctic flying techniques.—S.
