PUGWASH, N.S. (CP)—Cyrus Eaton, the Pugwash born Cleveland millionaire, played host to college presidents and deans from 11 American states and the province of New Brunswick at his summer home here Tuesday.

The college officials will be here until July 24 for informal discussions and relaxation. They spent part of Tuesday in a "spirited" discussion of Plato, the Greek philosopher.

Mr. Eaton returned here from his 3,000-acre farm at Deep Cove, on Nova Scotia's south shore, to welcome the group. A second group of college deans will be here for five days beginning July 26.

Last week 24 world scientists met at the Eaton home. They ended four days of discussion with a warning against the catastrophe of an atomic war.

NEWCASTLE - ON - TYNE (Reuters)—Dr. Charles Rob said Tuesday the best drug for the relief of pain is alcohol.

"I don't mean anything pharmaceutical, but whiskey," the London professor told a British Medical Association meeting.

He said it was an extremely good drug in reducing pain in surgical cases involving blood clots and helped the patients sleep.

"We put our patients on big and rapid doses of whiskey up to the maximum tolerance in individual cases," Dr. Rob said.
