DISCOVERY OF COPPER.—A report is current in Moncton of a valuable discovery of copper, made recently on the Grand Ance Shore, in the Parish of Dorchester. The discovery, it is said, was made by a boy, son of Mr. Charles Teed, farmer. Mr. Teed has been offered a considerable amount for a part of his property, and the outcrops of ore extend over various other farms.

THE St. Peter's Bazaar and Promenade Concert, which will take place to-morrow, bids fair to be very attractive. The bareness of the drill-shed has been broken by a superabundance of flags. Among the thousand and one things found usually at bazaars, there will be a fine display of flowers, pot-plants, and good-sized annuals in boxes. We hope to be able to furnish the programme of the concert to-morrow.

TRAIN DELAYED.—Yesterday's noon train from St. John was an hour and a half late reaching Moncton yesterday. It was delayed leaving St. John owing to the late arrival of the American boat with a large number of passengers, chiefly tourists, many of whom were bound for Prince Edward Island. The train was one of the longest regular passenger trains ever passing over the I. C. R., embracing nine or ten cars.—Moncton Times.

HEAVY SALE OF STOCKS.—About \$40,000 worth of stocks were disposed of by auction at Halifax on Wednesday. Glace Bay Mining Company shares, par value \$100, sold at 32 per cent; Halifax Gas Light Company, par value \$40, at 139 1/2; Nova Scotia Sugar Refinery brought 83 1/2, Starr Manufacturing Company 99 1/2, People's Bank 115, Union Bank 117 1/2, Merchants' Bank 140, Pictou Marine Railway 91 1/2, Halifax Fire Insurance Company 125 1/2, Bellevue Albertite and Oil Company 10 per cent, and Commercial Bank of Windsor 134.

F. Fraser. The Rev. John Padfield was appointed Secretary. It was unanimously resolved that the Lord Bishop of the Diocese be invited to become Patron of the Association.

BAND EXCURSION TO P. E. ISLAND.—The Moncton Cornet Band propose having an excursion to Charlottetown some time next month. The band is now communicating with Mr. Lunt in regard to the chances of obtaining the steamer City of St. John, now at Point du Chene, for the purpose. A dance and concert at Charlottetown would be a part of the programme in the event of the success of the project. The party would arrange to leave Point du Chene very early in the morning, reaching Charlottetown some time in the forenoon, and starting for home in time to reach here at a suitable hour next morning. This would make a very enjoyable excursion, and if the arrangements can be made for the steamer, it would no doubt be highly successful.—Moncton Times.
