LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

I. O. G. T.—Charlottetown Lodge meets to-night at 7.30 o'clock.

FROM MONTREAL.—The Tiber arrived yesterday and left again last night.

FORESTERS.—A new court is to be organized at Summerside this evening.

L. O. A.—The Royal Arch Degree will be conferred to-night in St. George 1 lodge. Visitors welcome.

SUMMERSIDE WATER.—Samples of the water from several wells in Summerside have been sent abroad for analysis.

BUILDING OPERATIONS.—This summer about twenty new buildings have been erected in Truro, costing between \$60,000 and \$70,000.

MASONIC.—A special convocation of Alexandria R. A. Chap No. 11, R. N. S., will be held at Chapter Rooms, Masonic Temple, this (Thursday) evening at 8 o'clock.

PROPERTY SOLD.—The warehouse and property belonging to Mrs. Robin, next to the Queen Hotel, Water Street, was sold by auction to-day, the purchaser being Edward Kelly, Esq., of Southport, for the sum of \$1,360. A. McNeill, Auctioneer, conducted the sale.

AT THE BRITS.—The annual prize meeting of No. 1 Company, G. A., was held yesterday afternoon. Sergt. Murky made the highest score, 71 points out of a possible 80 Corp. Acorn was second with 62 points. Gunners Riley, Peake and E. McLean tied with 60 points each. The winner was fine throughout, excepting for an occasional drive of rain. The prizes will be distributed to-night at the Brit Shed.

SCOTT ACT.—Summonses were yesterday afternoon served on William Thompson and John Macdonald for first contra-vention of the Scott Act. They are returnable on Monday. Thompson, it is said, is bartender at H. C. Conolly's, and Macdonald is similarly employed in P. P. Gillis's.

This forenoon William Seale was arrested on a warrant for violating the Canada Temperance Act. His case will come up for trial to-morrow.

The Scott Act cases against Charles Watling and Arthur Thorne came up for hearing at the police court to-day. The case against Watling was adjourned. Thorne's case was dismissed.

VISIT TO THE CONVENTS.—In conversation with Mr. Stewart, Supervisor of City Schools, in reference to his visit to Notre Dame and St. Joseph's Convents, he said, "I visited similar institutions in many of the leading cities of the Dominion, and have no hesitation in saying that Charlottetown institutions are, in every particular, equal, if not superior, to anything I have seen abroad. The departments are well equipped with modern school appliances, and the ladies in charge are clear observers of the latest improvements along educational lines. In both Convents there are a number of pupils from Quebec and other provinces, showing that these institutions are appreciated abroad, as well as at home."

A CREDIT TO KELLY'S CROSS.—One of the handsomest country houses in this Province is, undoubtedly, the new residence built this summer by the Creator Bros. for Mr. James Monaghan, of Kelly's Cross. The architectural design is decidedly original and beautiful, far more ambitious than is generally attempted in this line. The result is entirely pleasing. The work all through is of the first class in style, and is a splendid evidence of the capability of the builders. When it is added that the exterior of the house was recently painted by our esteemed house-painter, Mr. P. H. Trainor, in a number of pleasing shades, it will at once be understood that the building is completed in a manner that leaves nothing to be desired.

THE FASTNET.—The steamer Fastnet arrived from Halifax about eight o'clock last evening, and left again about one this morning. She had a general cargo both ways. Captain Carling's report, as given to the Examiner in his confidence concerning the responsibility for the collision reported yesterday. He, however, ever, said that the collision occurred about two o'clock on Wednesday morning, when the Fastnet was two or three miles from Souris. It was quite dark at the time, but there was freedom from fog. The Fastnet was heading for Souris light. Second Officer Leary had charge of the deck at the time, and the captain was in his room dressing, having just been called up to go on deck as they were nearing Souris. He heard shouting outside, and on opening the door to look out he was knocked off his feet by the bowsprit of the Express, which came in through the open doorway. After striking the Fastnet the schooner backed off, and the bowsprit tore away the side of the room and the bridge, and carried the captain outside. He was so badly hurt that he could not stand, and had to be taken to the saloon. After the collision the Fastnet forged ahead a short distance and then came back to look for the schooner, but was unable to ascertain the extent of the injuries she sustained. Both steamer and schooner proceeded to Souris, where the former arriving about half-past six o'clock. The captain had his injuries examined there. He is pretty badly lacerated about the legs but there are no bones broken.

WHILE CONSTABLES SLEPT,

Two Prisoners Make Their Escape From Custody.

ONE OF THEM IS RECAPTURED.

The Other Was at Large at Latest Accounts—Going to Summerside.

This morning about twenty minutes past five o'clock, according to a telephone message from Alberton, constables Charles R. Burke and George Gillon had the prisoners George McDougall, Henry McDougall and Ernest Forsyth in their custody at the Goreville House, up stairs on the first fl. The room was locked and the key on the inside of the door. George McDougall was asleep and the other two prisoners were handcuffed together, lying on the top of the bed with their clothes on their boots on.

George Gillon was on watch until four this morning, when he was relieved by Constable Burke. While sitting on a chair near the bed Burke fell asleep. Gillon remained in the room and also went to sleep.

Ernest Forsyth unlocked the handcuffs. It is not known where he procured the key, as Burke had it. Forsyth and Henry McDougall got off the bed, unlocked the door and went downstairs quickly. They took the bar off the front door and unlocked it.

Constable Burke followed soon after, and Gillon returned, and started to look after George McDougall. Burke kept after the other two, and captured Henry McDougall on the Main Street, opposite J. H. Myrick & Co's store. Ernest Forsyth escaped down the hill in the direction of Ellis' hotel.

Henry McDougall and George McDougall are in charge of the constable, and will go by the afternoon train to Summerside jail.

His gun burst, while firing, and the piece of iron which rests on the barrel went through the forehead into the skull. This piece was removed with great difficulty by Dr. Macneil, Kensington, who, however, accomplished the work very successfully. Part of the brain substance followed the iron, when it was extracted, showing how difficult and skillful an operation had to be performed, and the narrow escape of the wounded boy from instant death. The doctor left the patient resting comfortably, and not suffering any pain.—Summerside Journal.
