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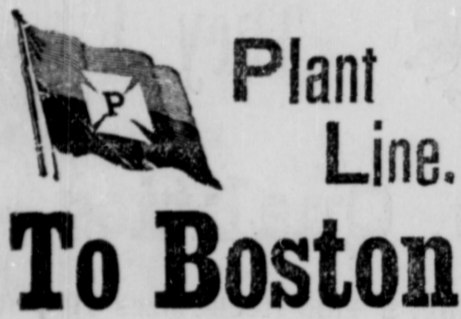

### TRIALS OF A PUBLIC MAN.

It Takes Time to Get Used to the Ways of Newspaper Correspondents.

A new member of the senate was complaining to an old member of some of the difficulties he was encountering. "For one thing," he said, "these newspaper fellows don't always get things straight. I don't mean to accuse them of carelessness or of intentional misrepresentation, but now and then some remarkable stories are printed about me at home."

"You'll get used to that," replied the veteran. "That won't hurt. That's part of your apprenticeship. I've been all along there. Let me tell you of a little experience of mine. Soon after I first came here I picked up a paper from my state and saw it asserted in a letter from Washington that my colleague and myself had met and arranged a slate, and that all the patronage for the state would be distributed according to that arrangement."

"There was no warrant for the statement, and I made inquiries for the correspondent. He came to see me and proved to be a bright and most agreeable young man. I asked him for his authority, and he pleasantly refused to give it, but said that he had every faith in his informant. To that I replied that all I would ask, then, would be the privilege of denying the story—of putting my statement against the other. The feeling arises not only from the fact that the Ministers who are not to negotiate are still imbued with the commercial union idea, but from the further fact that in international matters these gentlemen have betrayed, so far, utter and inexcusable ignorance. Mr Mulock did not know the meaning of the Berner postal convention, and thus made his British postage blunder. His speech recently made in Parliament indicates that he cannot even find that instrument, although it is printed in our own blue books. Sir Louis Davies and Mr. Fielding blundered over the meaning of the German commercial treaty in so far as it affects us, and it cost us something like \$7,000 to get the treaty explained to them. We are going into this thing handicapped as to men, and there need be no wonder that Mr. Bertram expresses himself a uneasy.
