

### Hungarian Refugee Complains But Another Side To Story

VANCOUVER (CP)—A Hungarian says Canada has failed so far in her role as "the great and noble refuge" for refugees from Communist Hungary.

Victor Papp - Vid, president of the Association of Free Hungarians in Canada, said in an interview Thursday that unless the situation improves for his people an estimated 40,000 job-starved Hungarians in Canada will try to leave it again. At least 80 per cent would leave within a year—given the opportunity—if the employment situation is not improved.

"We came in hope and joy," he said, "but we are sinking in despair."

The onetime deputy finance minister of Hungary is seeking establishment of a special commission of Hungarians to help solve their "deep hunger for work."

So far he has had no reply to his written request for establishment of the commission from Immigration Minister Pickersgill.

**VERY FEW HAVE JOBS**

"Only 15 per cent" of the thousands of Hungarians newly arrived in Canada are employed, he said.

"We were grateful for the opportunity to come to Canada. We came joyfully. But we have found the organization for jobs completely ineffectual—there is nothing to satisfy our hunger for work."

The Hungarian spokesmen, whose organization is centred on

the Vancouver area, denied reports Hungarians were offering to work for less pay than Canadian nationals.

Instead, he said, Canadian employers when they did have work for the Hungarian newcomers, "sometimes offer less pay than Canadians, are getting for the same job."

**SAYS HALF WORKING**

Alex Lockwood regional settlement officer for the immigration department here said at least 50 per cent of an estimated 2,000 employable Hungarian immigrants in this province have found jobs.

There is no evidence he said to indicate that up to 80 per cent of them would choose to leave British Columbia if given the opportunity.

Mr. Lockwood said Mr. Papp-Vid had recently been taken from Abbotsford camp at his own request in the face of threats of physical violence against him from fellow immigrants. Abbotsford is 45 miles east of here and about 700 Hungarians now are staying there.

"Other immigrants at Abbotsford took a strong stand against his attempts to regiment them" said Mr. Lockwood.

Employment for Mr. Papp-Vid had been found "on a number of occasions."

"He either quit the jobs voluntarily or failed to make good at them" Mr. Lockwood said.
