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Nairobi Native Will Migrate To Canada To Teach Ballet

Canada has received the blessing of the Canadian government immigration service, the office of which has classified her as a "cultural import."

Mrs. Dunstan Adams, intending to stay with her brother in Newfoundland on a government job to look around various areas in which to find the right spot in which to start her school.

"Who knows," she said, "I am looking for a place in the immediate object of my mind to set up the school, which will provide plenty of third work for a good while. When I have achieved that ambition, well, then, that is all I start thinking about."

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
