THE WEEK AT S. D. U.

Despite the many exhortations made and the many occasions on which the students are exhorted to lend their aid and support to a student organization it seems well-nigh impossible to ever draw their attention to some organizations and the roles which they play in college life. The university service groups both national and international appear as distinct entities on our campus. The proverb that "man learns by doing" is clear in this case, because one could hardly be expected to become a member of whose ideals and functions were not made known to them. Recent events have produced a source of significant changes along these lines through stimulating ideas and more concise knowledge of the functioning groups. Moscow Ballet Goes Next To Paris, Perhaps To U. S.

By FERN RICH LONDON (Reuters)—Moscow's Bolshoi Ballet director, Mikhail Chulaki, announced Thursday there have been "unofficial" discussions about taking the Russian dancers to the United States. At a press conference in Covent Garden's Royal Opera House here, Chulaki said a trip to the United States "is only an idea—this question has been raised in an unofficial way so far only between theatre people." The director confirmed that the company will perform at the Paris Opera soon, with only technical details and a date still to be settled. The Bolshoi dancers opened here Oct. 3—the company's first performance in the West in its 200-year history. When the season closes at Covent Garden, the ballet will perform on three nights—Oct. 31, Nov. 1 and 2—at a theatre in Croydon, a London suburb. LONG WAIT - Wednesday night, fans started lining up at Croydon for tickets, although the box office will not open until this morning. At Covent Garden Thursday, the Bolshoi's fabulous 46-year-old ballerina, Galina Ulanova, spoke to reporters for the first time since her arrival here. Ulanova, Chulaki, Bolshoi choreographer Leonid Lavrovsky and a cultural attaché from the Russian Embassy here were all smiles as they faced reporters in the red plush and gilt room next to the theatre's royal box. Ulanova wore a tailored tan suit, a black woolen sweater and flat-heeled black suede moccasins. Her blonde hair was drawn back severely and she wore a coral-colored lipstick. OLD-FASHIONED - While the questions went back and forth through a woman interpreter, Ulanova smoked an English cigar and gently massaged her left knee. Asked whether she had read criticisms that the Bolshoi is not as modern as productions seen in England, Ulanova said she had seen comments that "our decor

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seems to be a little old-fashioned, but some things in your ballet will also seem old-fashioned." Chulaki took up the argument by saying he had seen Britain's Sadler's Wells Ballet but "to compare that ballet with the modern ballet we had in the 1920s is like a little kitten compared with a big cat." He said the Russians had discarded the modern ballet and now "try to find the humanity, the real life." "You will also do this," he predicted. TOWN CLERK - WOLFVILLE, N.S. (CP)—Albert W.
