Committee Discusses Question Of S'side Rink

Whether Summerside, the rinkless town of the Maritimes, wants a rink or not, was the main question on the agenda at a special meeting of the Citizens Committee held last evening at the Canadian Legion Home.

The committee is composed of representatives of various service clubs, the Town of Summerside, the Canadian Legion, the Department of Physical Fitness, and in view of the fact that the only available rink, Notre Dame Street outdoor arena, will no longer operate, the committee went on record as unanimously agreeing that something must be done, as soon as possible, to provide a skating arena, whether it is to be a natural ice rink or an artificial ice rink.

The Citizens Committee which was formed about a year ago, has made several attempts in the past to formulate a definite plan whereby such an arena might be constructed.

With the opening of the Notre Dame Street rink it was felt that, for a time at least, the lack of a skating arena was taken care of. However, the venture which was undertaken by Messrs. H. E. Gaudet and J. K. Curran did not receive the support of the general public and an announced several days ago they have decided to operate the rink no longer.

In the spring the dressing rooms and the canteen will be dismantled. It was as a direct result of the closing down of this rink that the committee decided that once again the matters of a permanent skating arena for Summerside must be taken up and steps taken to provide this and future generations with such a necessary structure.

The committee felt that before anything definite can be undertaken complete information must be procured regarding cost of construction, type of rink to be built, and with such information they would then be in a position to go before the general public who it was felt realized the necessity and would support the move.

Acting as secretary of the meeting Mr. W. A. Currie is instructed to contact officials in various centers of the Maritime Provinces with a view to ascertaining construction costs and all other information on which the committee could base its estimates.

It was hoped that this information would be available in about one week, at which time the committee will again meet and formulate a definite course of action.

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Fire In Malpeque

—Fire believed to have been caused by a chicken brooder broke out on Thursday morning during the height of the storm in a warehouse owned by the Malpeque Trading Company in Kensington.

Large Business During 1951 In Crapaud Creamery

The past year saw the largest yearly business turnover in the history of the Crapaud Creamery Company, since it was first organized in 1897.

This was made known in the secretary's report given at the annual meeting of the creamery held in Crapaud hall on Monday of this week.

The report showed butter sales for the year totalling \$200,000.00; feed sales of \$85,000.00; and revenue from the cold storage plant \$3,500.00.

The top three patrons leading in cream production for the year, each receiving over two thousand dollars for cream supplied to the factory, were (1) Charles Pooley, Tryon; (2) Albro Howatt, Tryon; and (3) Ray Tanton, Kinkora, R. R.

It is a matter of considerable interest that very thorough and detailed records of the minutes of the meetings of this organization have been kept which go back to the very first meeting which was held in 1897.

Officers elected for the ensuing year were:— President, A. R. Toombs, Tryon; Vice-president, John H. Myers, Hampton; Directors, Jack Nicholson, Crapaud; John Simpson, Crapaud; Mark Cameron, Hampton; E. C. Holmes, Hampton; Parker Francis, Tryon; manager, L. H. Rogerson, Crapaud; secretary-treasurer, B. C. Wood, Crapaud.

Mr. John H. Myers in addressing the meeting, gave an optimistic outlook on the future of dairy industry, stating that the prospects for the consumption of butter were increasing and production of butter was not as high as it might be because labor costs, feeds, etc., were quite high. For that reason, he said, there was not apt to be an over production.

He mentioned the fact that we are today importing butter from other countries, and stressed the fact that farmers should not turn away from the dairy industry.—S.
