

Local and Other Items.

Sailed for Boston. The steamer Worcester, Captain Nickerson, sailed for Boston shortly after midnight with a general cargo and one passenger—Miss Brown.

CREDITABLE INCREASE.—The C. P. R. traffic at Indian Head shows a creditable increase over any previous year. For the last six weeks, the outward business alone reached over \$10,000.

THE LUMBER CUT.—It is now estimated that the lumber cut at the Chaudiere for this season will be about 360,000,000 feet, a falling off of about 10 per cent. from last year's cut, which was the largest for many years.

THAT DIVORCE CASE.—It is stated that, owing to insufficiency of notice, the Middleton divorce case will not come before the Senate the coming session, unless the rule requiring six months' notice of application is suspended.

LUMBER SHIPMENTS.—Thirty-one vessels of 14,031 tons, have sailed from Richibucto this year laden with 12,988,000 feet of lumber for the United Kingdom, and six vessels of 1,907 tons, carrying 1,763,000 feet of deals, have sailed for Buetouche.

CHRISTMAS TREE.—Dr. Blanchard is preparing an elaborate Christmas Tree for the pleasure and benefit of his patients at Falconwood; and it is hoped that the public will cheerfully contribute towards it, either in money or in suitable articles.

UNSAFE SPORT.—The cable despatches report a terrible accident at a French duel. One of the performers was killed and the other wounded. The incident will have had effect on the popularity of this sport. It will soon be no safer than football.

FIRE AT SACKVILLE.—Benjamin Beharrel's barn at Frosby Hollow, Sackville, was burned Tuesday afternoon, with 40 tons of hay, 10 head of cattle, 300 bushels of oats, agricultural implements, etc. The barn was new and large, only recently built. Loss, \$1,200.

THE WEATHER PROPHECY AGAIN.—Professor Wiggins has broken out again, but the attack is a mild one. He says there will not be a recurrence in North America of the disastrous earthquakes of the Southern States and Central America before A. D. 1900, but he cannot say the same of Europe and the far east.

METHODIST NEWS.—From the St. John Sun we learn that the Rev. Mr. Shenton has accepted a call to Woodstock, N. B. The same paper reports also that Revs. W. E. Reynolds and D. H. Lodge, of P. E. Island, are seeking transfers—the former to Ontario, and the latter to Nova Scotia; also that Rev. Mr. Embree, President of the Newfoundland Conference, is anxious to be transferred to the N. B. and P. E. I. territory.

A VOICE FROM MAINE.—The investigations of the Banzer Commercial serve to confirm the statement of the St. John Sun that there is no very vigorous sentiment in New Brunswick for Commercial Union. The Commercial found only one vigorous supporter of it, and he seems to be an annexationist as well as a unionist. Most of the gentlemen conversed with were in favor of the renewal of the Reciprocity Treaty of 1854, which, in view of the recent declaration of the Halifax Chronicle that the Dominion got a good deal more out of that arrangement than the United States, is not surprising.—Portland, Me., Press.

THE LAST SAD RITES.—The mortal remains of the late Rev. Dr. Grant were consigned to their last resting place in the graveyard at Cardigan to-day. His Lordship Bishop McIntyre and the majority of the clergymen of the diocese were present, and took part in the ceremonies usual on such occasions. Sisters St. Cornelia and Angelina, Superiors of the Convent de Notre Dame, and St. Joseph, respectively, were also present. The funeral sermon was, we understand, preached by Rev. J. A. Macdonald, of St. Dunstan's College. The Bishop and the city clergy will probably return to town to-morrow forenoon.

PERSONAL.—Rev. Allan Macdonald, who has been in Montreal for some time past negotiating for the erection of a memorial window in the Chapel at Fort Augustus, arrived in the city last evening. Rev. D. M. Gordon arrived at Picton from Winnipeg on the 30th ult. A Picton despatch says:—"After spending some time here and visiting friends everywhere he will go to Halifax, his new sphere of labor. Mr. Gordon is a native of our town, and out of nearly 100 men Picton county has given to the ministry, he takes a front rank, and is deferred to and beloved by all who know him."

HOLIDAYS.—Health is largely dependent on variety; and a great deal of labor is so monotonous, that the interval of Sunday, even if it only breaks the route of labor, has a beneficent influence. And every opportunity should be secured, not only for breathing fresh air by exercise in parks or open spaces, or on country roads, but for enjoying form and color in nature, and variety of growth and habit in life. Holidays have well been called a holy institution, for they take us away from the shadowed side of the world, where monotony induces intellectual or moral somnolence, to spots where the sun shines, leaves gladden, and the eye in moments of relaxation drinks in the moral sustenance which nature offers in her beauty, calm, ceaseless work, and varied conditions.

A NEW BARONET.—The Canadian Gazette says: "Many Canadians will join in heartily congratulating Mr. H. S. Northcote, M. P., upon the honor of a baronetcy which he has just received at the hands of Her Majesty. Not alone by his marriage in 1873 with the daughter of Sir George Stephen, has Mr. Northcote long been associated with Canada and Canadians. As early as 1871 he was attached to the Marquis of Ripon's special mission to arrange the Alabama treaty, and in the years immediately following he was secretary to Her Majesty's Claim Commission under the Treaty of Washington. In more recent years he has become even more intimately associated with Canadian interests, and until very lately was a director of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, and some associated undertakings."

THE FRENCH CRISIS.

Wild Scenes in Paris.

The Mob Dictates to the Government.

GREY IN A QUANDARY.

PARIS, Dec. 1., 1 p. m.

President Grey this forenoon informed the Ministerial Council that in view of the change in the situation he did not propose to make a communication to parliament to-day. The communication Grey was to make was a letter resigning the presidency of the Republic. M. Rouvier will announce this decision of M. Grey to the Chamber of Deputies and will again tender the resignation of the Cabinet.

It is reported that President Grey will shortly form a new ministry.

LATER.

The excitement in the city is intense. A mob gathered in front of the Palace Elysee crying for the President to resign. A revolution demonstration is expected. Troops guard the entrance to the Palace. The crowds in front of the Palace Bourbon became so demonstrative that cavalry was obliged to charge them.

There was a big demonstration in front of the Russian Embassy to-day, crowds shouting "Vive le Russia." The police dispersed the gathering. A council was held at the Elysee Palace after the second sitting of the Chamber. Rouvier explained the bearing of the vote. Grey asked each Minister his opinion. All said immediate resignation was peremptory. Grey replied the Chamber had brought about the existing situation, and the Chamber must bear the responsibility before the judgment seat of history. No doubt is entertained that the President will resign. The Congress meets on Saturday.

WINTER SERVICE

Steamer Lansdowne on the Route.

OTTAWA, Dec. 1.

The Government steamer Lansdowne has been ordered to perform winter service between Picton and Georgetown. The Northern Light will be kept in readiness at Georgetown in case of emergency.

The Hay Claim

MONTREAL, Dec. 1.

The French Chamber of Commerce here have adopted a resolution asking Sir Charles Tupper, Canadian representative on the Fishery Commission, to demand payment by the American Government of the claim against it for hay duties on the same principal that the United States asked, and obtained reimbursement from Canada of considerable sums stolen by St. Albar's raiders' payment by Great Britain of the Alabama claims.

The Situation in Russia.

ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 1.

The Ministry have asked the Czar whether, in view of the political situation, it is desirable to hold an Educational Congress in 1888, or postpone it to 1889. The Czar replied that it could be held next year. He said the political outlook was satisfactory. There was no fear of new complications.

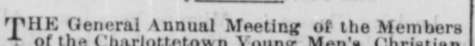

ADRESSED to the undersigned, and endorsed "Proposals for Construction of Water Works," "Proposals for Water Pipes," &c., as the case may be, will be received at this office until noon on

instant, as follows:—

(a) For what amount the work will be constructed, to be owned by the City, the offers to be made in accordance with conditions as to security and otherwise contained in forms of Proposal and the Specifications and Plans to be seen at the Office of the Water Commissioners for the City of Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, or at the office of their Engineer, M. M. FIDEL, Esq., 10 Tremont Street, Boston, Mass., after the 15th instant, for the cast iron pipes and pipe laying; and after the 15th instant for the balance of the specifications and plans, which will include Reservoirs, Gates and Hydrants, excepting those for the pumping station, which will be ready on the 25th instant. Bidders may offer for the whole work, or for the separate parts indicated in the forms of Proposal, but those offering for the whole work will be required to fill up and sign each of the said forms; or

(b) For what annual subsidy a private company will supply the said City for fire purposes and for watering the streets with eight-foot-proof hydrants, having a pressure sufficient to throw water to a height of at least sixty feet in every part of the City, and the annual rate for each additional hydrant which the said City may from time to time require; as also the maximum annual rate per faucet at which the company will supply water to citizens for private use, each tender to expressly stipulate that the water will be taken from the sources, and the whole work to be done according to the specifications and plans referred to in paragraph (a); or

(c) For what amount the work will be constructed to be owned by the City; or for what annual subsidy a private company will supply the said City for fire purposes and private use as mentioned in paragraph (b), the bidder to name his source of water supply, and accompany his tender with plans and specifications.

Each tender under paragraphs (b) and (c) must be accompanied by an accepted bank cheque, payable to the order of the Water Commissioners for the City of Charlottetown for the sum of Five Thousand Dollars. This cheque will be forfeited if the party decline the contract, or fail to complete the work contracted for, and will be returned in case of non-acceptance of tender.

The Water Commissioners do not bind themselves to accept the lowest or any tender.
