Island Odds And Ends

The profanity rate among Charlottetown motorists is lowering in ratio to the rapid repair of the city's streets. It is remarkable the effect a smattering of well-placed asphalt can have on the King's English, as spoken by automobile owners.

Two hundred Islanders are now employed in Labrador on the construction of the large American air-base at that strategic defence location. Not so many years ago most Canadians when they thought of Labrador at all, dismissed it quickly from their thoughts as a barren hinterland of little or no economic value, and in nowise a military asset. Today it is a storehouse of high-grade iron ore destined to feed the great steel mills of the United States and Canada with vital raw material. Its importance defensively can be gauged with some accuracy, when it is realized that both Canada and the United States have immense air-bases there. Present defence expansion being carried out by the Americans is estimated to cost seventy-five million dollars. A small fraction of this will find its way to P. E. I. Island in the shape of what can be aptly called, take-home-pay.

Two teams of Canadian immigration officials will visit the Province during the summer and autumn to familiarize themselves with local conditions. The first group will arrive early in August and the second in October. Because agriculture is our chief industry they will devote special attention to it and will visit a number of farms. They expect to obtain a better idea of the type of European best suited for work or settlement on Island farms.

This practical job-training for men who will assist in selecting new Canadian citizens should be very helpful. All of the farm-workers who reach this Province for instance, have not proved to be experienced in agriculture, and even with a farm background have used far different methods in tilling the soil than employed on this Island. The chief complaint however has arisen from the fact that few new Canadians plan to remain at farming indefinitely. Like many farm-raised Canadians they head for the cities as soon as possible.

There are nevertheless, Dutch immigrants who prefer farm life to city life and with good selection these people could be directed to the Island and settle down contentedly. Selection of the right type of farm worker is so important, in fact, that the visit of these immigration officials, who will screen the newcomers to this country, should be of interest to all our farmers.

The Islanders Hockey Club has a sizable deficit, but the team seems to have the town solidly behind it providing the new executive cuts player salaries, and other expenses are trimmed to fit the local pocket book. As to the deficit itself the executive and the club's many supporters are mapping a program which should wipe out a good slice of the deficit come winter-time. At any rate it is quite certain that the Islanders will be in the centre of the Maritime hockey wars again next winter.

America is learning a whole lot about its new task of world-leadership these days. Anyone who revisits the country after a lapse of years can discern the change in attitude of the man in the street. The cockiness so apparent after World War I is no longer in evidence. In that conflict the Americans were the deciding factor but never underwent the ordeal of a retreat. But in World War II they took an early beating from the Japs, and in Korea the Chinese hustled them backwards many miles, a year ago. In both instances they were outbumped and had no choice, a new experience for them.

French and British military reverses in both World Wars are more understandable to the Yanks now; they know that men and material in quantities will wars. They have indeed a high respect for Canada's forest in Korea not to speak of the British and Australians.
