

Habs Down Rangers 6-1 With Royal Couple As Interested Spectators

FORUM, Montreal, Oct. 29 — (CP)—Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh saw their first full-length hockey game to night and it turned out to be a 6-1 runaway for Montreal Canadiens over New York Rangers, played Friday night.

Maurice Richard fired a pair for himself, bringing his season total to seven and his National Hockey League service total to 299.

The Royal couple, along with 14,048 customers, appeared to enjoy the game immensely, particularly Philip who applauded as the goals were scored.

Ken Mosdell accounted for Canadiens' first goal. It came only 15 seconds before the first period ended and erased the one-goal lead set up earlier by Reggie Sinclair of Rangers.

The game dragged frequently and at times play was ragged. Only the fat surplus of Montreal goals kept the crowd worked up with excitement.

Princess Elizabeth followed play intently but Philip was more demonstrative. He scanned his program often and at one time pointed out Maurice Richard to his wife. He seemed highly amused when Don Raleigh of Rangers was sent tumbling almost over the boards by Ross Lowe, and again when Richard and Steve Kraftcheck almost came to blows just before the game ended.

Curry's stunt of scoring three goals in one period wasn't a record as the feat was pulled off a number of times last year, including three times by the Canadiens.

The Rocket was one of the Canadiens scoring three goals in a period last year.

Sinclair's goal came on an angle shot on passes from Edgar Laprade, and Ed Kullman. Mosdell got it back by steering in Gable's passout from the back boards.

Then Curry took over completely in the second period. His first came when he tipped in Mosdell's shot. His second, 10 minutes later, followed another Mosdell shot which struck defenseman Jack Evans. Curry was trailing on the play and had a wide open shot. Late in the period he got his third. The puck was deflected past goalie Chuck Rayner by Kraftcheck's stick.

Richard's first goal at 13:38 of the last period was an easy shove-in after Lach's passout from the boards. In the final minute he took another Lach passout and backhanded the puck past Rayner who was partly out of his net.

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Suzanne Morrow To Skate For Canada At World Skating Meet

OTTAWA, Oct. 29 — (CP) — Suzanne Morrow of the Toronto Skating Club has been chosen to represent Canada at the Olympic and world's figure skating championships this winter, it was announced tonight.

Charles H. Cumming, secretary of the Canadian Figure Skating Association, said Miss Morrow, three-time Canadian champion and runner-up last winter for the North American title, was chosen Saturday at the annual meeting of the association in Toronto.

The Olympic skating championships are to be held at Oslo, Norway with Paris the site of the world's championships.

"Possibly four or five other Canadian representatives will be chosen at the Canadian championships," Mr. Cumming said. The Dominion event would be held in Oshawa, Ont., Jan. 17-19.

Donald B. Cruikshank of Ottawa was elected president of the association at the Toronto meeting which was attended by 45 delegates from across Canada. He succeeds Alfred Williams of Calgary, W. de Nance, Sr. of Toronto is first vice-president and Herbert Larson of Saskatoon, second vice-president.

Add Gold To Minerals Found In Outer Space

CHICAGO, Oct. 29 — (AP) — Future space cadets may take off to hunt for gold in the upper air. They may, that is, if the cosmic ray explorers who report Saturday to the American Institute of Physics continue discovering metals 20 miles above the earth.

At that altitude these cosmic explorers are finding heavier and heavier metals and chemical elements. These are all single atoms.

Two years ago they discovered iron. On Saturday discoveries were reported of tin, copper and zirconium, and also of the gases bromine and krypton.

These atoms are the cosmic rays. Most plentiful is hydrogen. But all the other chemical elements are expected, and gold and silver should be early discoveries.

The new heavy elements were reported by Herman Vagoda, of the National Health Institute, Bethesda, Md. They are found by sending photographic plates up in big balloons. The plates contain emulsion an eighth of an inch thick. The atoms hit the emulsion and leave electrified trails whose density identifies the atoms.

The energies of these cosmic atoms is tremendous. Dr. Vagoda reports one with an energy of 120,000,000,000 electron-volts. They hit molecules of upper air and the impacts set off rays which drive all the way down to earth. Occasionally one impact sets off 100 rays.

Where these space atoms come from is not certain. It is believed a lot of them come from the sun.

LONDON, Oct. 29 — (AP) — Three horses were scratched from the Cambridgeshire stakes today. This leaves 48 still eligible to run in the 1 1/4-mile race at Newmarket Wednesday.

Those scratched were Devon Prince, Le Banquier and Rock and Pryn.
