TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

The English Strikes.

LONDON, Aug. 27.

The printers employed by Eyre, Spottiswoode, Cassell & Co. and Waterlow & Sons have struck.

One hundred thousand striking dock laborers marched in procession today. They were orderly.

The coal men in the thousands have joined the strikers.

The situation shows no signs of improvement. Meetings of the employers and workmen are held without result. The Commercial company has declined the proposal of delegates from leading houses of twelve different trades to submit to arbitration the grievances of the workmen. To-day the drivers of the Government mail carts demanded an advance in wages which the post office authorities granted.

A few vessels are unloading on the Mersey, to which the strike has not extended.

The Salvation Army, the London Cottage mission and similar bodies are materially assisting the strikers with cheap gratuitous meals and lodgings.

Mr. Burns at a meeting to-night pronounced the strike a stepping stone to a greater and united movement of the working men throughout the country. The present struggle would teach a lesson of union.

The Cronin Murder.

LONDON, Aug. 27.

The Times says that as a result of yesterday's proceedings Burke, Coughlan, Sullivan and Kunze have been placed in such a position that they cannot turn State's evidence or become witnesses for the prosecution in the Cronin case. In their affidavits for separate trials each swears he knows absolutely nothing about the murder. In consequence the men cannot, without becoming themselves perjurers, go upon the witness stand and tell anything about it.

Only two of the accused are thus left by the attorneys for the defence open to become informers. The two are Beggs and Woodruff.

Justice Field Discharged.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 27.

The United States Circuit Court was informed to-day that the charge of murder against Justice Stephen J. Field had been dismissed by the Stockton Court. Judge Sawyer accordingly dismissed the habeas corpus proceedings in the case of Justice Field.

Consequences of the Strike.

LONDON, Aug. 27.

In consequence of the strike thousands of tons of mutton are rotting. It is impossible to find men to handle the stock. The committee of strikers declines to allow even perishable articles to be unloaded. Coal is double its usual price and all produce is advancing. The biscuit factories are stopped for want of flour.

The Ruler of Cashmere.

LONDON, Aug. 27.

In the House of Lords to-day, Viscount Cross, Secretary of State for India, was compelled to accept the resignation of the Ruler of Cashmere, and place the country under a native council. He said that the Government had not the slightest intention of annexing Cashmere.

Another Navy.

LONDON, Aug. 29.

A despatch from Brussels to the Times says that the Swiss Bundorath is discussing the question of creating a Swiss commercial maritime navy.

Earthquake.

LONDON, Aug. 27.

An earthquake was experienced on the Russian frontier yesterday. In the village of Khenzorik, 129 persons were buried alive.

Sad Drowning Accident.

BETWEEN nine and ten o'clock this morning a little girl looking over the side of one of Connolly's wharves noticed the body of a boy lying at the bottom of the dock. She told what she saw to some men, and the body was, as soon as possible, taken from its resting place. The drowned lad proved to be James Edmund, the eleven-year-old son of Mr. James Handrahan, carpenter, who lives on Dorchester Street.

Just how the accident happened is not definitely known. Near where the body was found a small single-screw boat was at anchor. One theory is that the lad got on board this boat, and in trying to lift the anchor, fell overboard, and being unable to swim, was drowned. Another is that the boat slipped from under the little fellow as he was getting from her to the wharf, and in falling he struck against the wharf, stunning himself.

There was no one with the lad when the accident occurred. The body had been in the water upwards of an hour when discovered. The boy's coat was found floating in the tide near the head of the wharf a short time before the body was found. The boy was seen going in the direction of the wharf shortly after seven o'clock this morning.
