MacKenzie District Seen Nearing Province Status

OTTAWA (CP) — A former commissioner of the Northwest Territories said Monday the Mackenzie district should be granted a greater degree of self-government but that the Kewatin and Franklin districts should remain under the federal government. Maj. Gen. Howard Young, 67, who served as the Territories' first commissioner from 1950 to 1954, also said there should be a review of government in the North in another six years to see if Mackenzie was ready to become a province and if the other districts could advance towards self-government. He was the first witness to appear before the advisory council on the development of government in the Northwest Territories as it opened week-long hearings here. WANTS EARLY ACTION Gen. Young said development of government in Mackenzie should not be held back because of slow progress in the Franklin and Kewatin. Responsibility for development of the Kewatin and Franklin should be placed in the hands of the deputy minister of northern affairs. Unless there was a strong demand for it, there should be no elected members to the council looking after Kewatin and Franklin. Gen. Young suggested Yellowknife as the natural capital for Mackenzie. He said the important factor was to bring decision-making to the North. For this reason, he said the idea of extending provincial boundaries of the bordering provinces northward was not practical because decisions then would be made in the provincial capitals — which were just as far away as Ottawa.

OTTAWA — A loan estimated at \$1,667 has been approved for the village of North Rustico by the Municipal Development and Loan Board. The money will assist in the construction of a sewer extension. The loan is for a period of 40 years and will bear interest at 5 1/2 per cent per annum. For projects completed by March 31, 1956, North Rustico will benefit from a forgiveness of 25 per cent of the loan amount. The loan brings to nine the number approved for the Island province. Their total amount is \$738,341.

inspect the ship because she flew a Panamanian flag," Niebergall said, "but let's say we gave it a real good, close look when it was in dry dock six weeks ago." CURRAN DISAGREES However, Joseph Curran, president of the National Maritime Union, said the coast guard inspection covered only minimum standards set by international convention. "We say this is a disgrace," Curran said. "We think the same safety regulations applying to U.S. flagships should apply to foreign flagships soliciting their business in the United States. . . . The Greek captain of the 5,000-ton death ship, Byron Voussinas, refused to tell reporters his story of the deadly fire at sea. Voussinas, who had vanished in Nassau after his rescue, showed up suddenly in Miami Monday and was closeted for one hour, 10 minutes with a coast guard preliminary inquiry board. But when the captain emerged from the hearing room, a lawyer for Yarmouth Cruise Lines told him not to talk to waiting reporters. Health Program Must Include Drug Services, Council Says

A proposal that any health care program, to be comprehensive, must initially include pharmaceutical services, provided at the retail level by qualified pharmacists, was made by the Atlantic Provinces Pharmaceutical Advisory Council at a recent meeting in Truro, N.S. Attending the meeting, which was chaired by Paul M. Briggs of Fredericton, N.B., were representatives of the N.S., N.B. and P.E.I. Pharmaceutical Societies. There was considerable discussion on the position of pharmacy in the health insurance plans being formulated by the federal and provincial governments. The council recognized deficiencies present in the health insurance plan as recommended by the Royal Commission on Health Services. Plans were made for a program of continuing education to be held in conjunction with the spring meeting of A.P.P.A.C. scheduled for Halifax during May of 1956. INDIO, Calif. (AP)—Wreckage of a twin-jet transport that vanished with eight aboard after take-off Sunday from nearby Palm Springs was found Monday in hills north of here. There were no survivors. The craft was a jet leased from the Flying Tiger Line by the Paul Kelly Flying Service of Burbank, Calif. The passengers apparently were returning to the Los Angeles area after watching a weekend air show, the Palm Springs Aerofest.

SOURIS — Souris Regional High School students began their sale of chocolate bars Monday with the first bar being sold by Kenneth Mooney of Bear River to Souris Mayor R.A. Leard at a student assembly. The high school's 385 students have approximately 3100 bars to sell during the project which lasts from Nov. 15 to Nov. 29. The money collected will go to the student's council. A total of \$60 in prize money will go to the most industrious student.

ROSTER STANDS AT 81 The roster of the missing and presumed dead stood at 81. Three names were added to the list of missing and presumed dead. One man rescue at sea died of burns in a Nassau hospital. Two others reported lost turned up safely Monday. The Yarmouth Castle, built in Philadelphia, was launched in 1927 as the Evangeline and assigned, along with a sister ship named Yarmouth, to the Boston-Yarmouth, N.S., summer service of Eastern Steamship Lines. During the winter the two ships made cruise trips out of New York. In 1941, the Evangeline was converted into a troopship and after the war carried war brides to North America. The ships were returned to the Nova Scotia run in 1947. McCormack Steamship Corp. of Miami bought the Evangeline in 1954 for Caribbean cruising. Known by this time as the Yarmouth Castle, she served again on the Boston-Nova Scotia run after 1955.
