The Franchise Bill.

LONDON, Oct. 24. The Liberals have agreed to refrain from partaking in any discussion of the Franchise Bill. The Times, in a leading article, advises the government to proceed with the subject of redistribution as soon as the Franchise Bill has been passed by the House of Commons.

The Cabinet and the Nile Expedition.

LONDON, Oct. 24. The Cabinet has not yet sanctioned the advance of the Nile expedition to Khartoum. They will not decide the question before the return of Lord Northbrook, the British high commissioner, who is now in Egypt. Gen. Walseley will be ready on November 1st, to advance from Wady Halfa.

Irish Papers Exultant.

DUBLIN, Oct. 24. The weekly Nationalist papers are exultant over the resignation of Trevelyan from the Chief Secretaryship of Ireland. The United Ireland encourages the authorities of Limerick to remain steadfast in their resistance of the tax for the payment of the extra police force.

French and Chinese Losses.

LONDON, Oct. 24. The attack in which the French confess to have lost 106 killed, took place on Sept. 15. The Chinese state they lost only four men, and captured 100 Frenchmen.

The Quebec Explosions.

OTTAWA, Oct. 24. A private detective is working up the Quebec explosion case. He has discovered evidence showing that it was due to local influence and not to any Fenian outrage.

Home Rule.

LONDON, Oct. 24. The Parnellites intend to move a fourth amendment to the address in reply to the Queen's Speech on the subject of Home Rule.

The Sullivan Fund.

DUBLIN, Oct. 24. It is proposed to raise by subscriptions a fund of £10,000 for the benefit of the family of the late Alexander M. Sullivan.

Postal Instructions.

OTTAWA, Oct. 24. The Postmaster General has issued instructions to post offices that no more defaced money is to be taken.

The Nile Expedition.

LONDON, Oct. 24. It is stated that the expense of the Nile expedition will be met by adding a penny to the income tax.

Ordered to China.

LONDON, Oct. 24. The man-of-war Rambler has received orders to proceed to Chinese waters in November.

Two Villages Burned.

HOMELESS AND STARVING. A Gaspé, Que., despatch of the 21st says: News has just reached here that a fire, started by people clearing brush land, spread during last night to the village of Chlorydome, situated about half way between Gaspé and Matane, destroying all the houses and fishing boats of the place, and rendering about twenty families homeless. The unfortunate people at first took shelter in the woods, but were soon surrounded by fire and obliged to flee to the sea shore, where they are utterly destitute and have not had any food to eat this morning. Immediate assistance is necessary, but as the fishery on this coast has been very poor, the neighboring villages can render but scanty aid to the poor sufferers. One family is reported missing, but may turn up. The poor people saved nothing and with the cold season at hand their sufferings will be very great unless assistance reaches them soon.

LATER.—Telegrams from Gaspé on the 23rd announce that settlements of Pointe au Fregate and Petite Anse are completely destroyed by fire. Thirty-five families are homeless and starving. Assistance is being organized in Quebec.

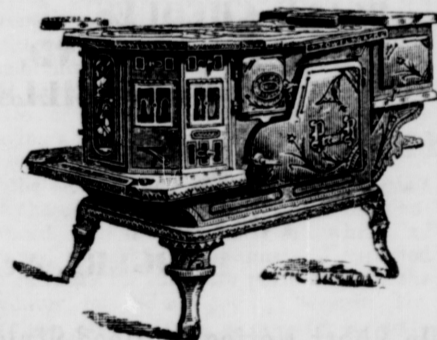
