Orange-growing in Arizona is declared to have passed the experimental stage, and will become an important industry in the territory.

Miland Empire: "It seems advisable for the Liberal election by getting a new series of title and other policies."

The Victoria Colonist asks:—"Is there anyone in the Liberal party or out of the Liberal party who can say with any right to definiteness and certitude what is the Liberal trade policy at this present moment?" If the Liberal leader intrudes parading in the budget debate he will give the Colonist an answer.

The Federal Council of Switzerland has authorized the President of the Republic to accept the proposal tendered by the Governments of Great Britain and the United States, that in the event of a disagreement as to the choice of an arbitrator for the Canadian sealers' claims the President of Switzerland shall designate an arbitrator.

A London cable to the New York World says: The Times intimates that the situation in the Transval is much more serious than it appears to be on the surface. It calls attention to the fact that the appeals against the Boers, and the despatches stating that there is imminent danger, cabled to it by Uitlanders, are sent from points under British rule, thus showing an absolute censorship of telegrams by the Transval authorities.
