

CLIPPINGS.

Harvest prospects in Europe are very encouraging. Charles Bradlaugh has a brother who is an evangelist. The state of affairs in Ireland is causing increased alarm. Sir Leonard Tilley is recreating at St. Andrews, N. B. A Turkish frigate with 1,000 troops has left Suda Bay for Tripoli. A City of Mexico despatch says the Senate has passed the Eads ship railway bill. The Princess Dolgorouki, it is said, has already invested between \$3,000,000 and \$3,000,000 in American securities. Three persons have been arrested in connection with the discovery of an explosive and bomb factory at Montrange, in France. Professor Goldwin Smith has named Friday, June 3rd, for the dinner proposed to be given in his honor by the Canadian Press Association. Sojourner Truth, the venerable African, who is now 106 years old, has received from England a gift of a silk gown, which she declares, "I am bound to live to wear. I have started in for another hundred years, and I want to live no more than ever. There is no better world than this."

The St. John Sun says that drawbacks are henceforth to be allowed of the duty paid on any imported manufactured article which is used in the manufacture of any article for export from Canada, provided that the importer of such article give evidence that it is not manufactured in Canada, and that nothing manufactured in Canada can be substituted for it. This Order-in-Council is another evidence of the determination of the Government to promote Canadian industries, and to aid our manufacturers to compete with foreigners in foreign markets.

A pleasant little reminiscence of Lord Beaconsfield's boyhood comes from an old schoolmate, who declares that the twelve year old Benjamin showed no unusual zeal for classical studies. But he was the compiler and editor of a weekly school newspaper which made its appearance on Saturdays. This was the day also on which the official gingerbread seller made his visitation, and the right to peruse little Diarrell's journal was regularly disposed of at the cost a sheet of gingerbread, that delicious commodity having a money value of the third of a penny.

THE BEEF TRADE.—Messrs. Dickey and Buckley shipped per "Hibernian," at Halifax, on Monday, 244 quarters slaughtered at Amherst. Mr. Symes' correspondents in England failed to honor his draft for dead meat shipped, and it was disposed of on account of Messrs. Dickey and Buckley. The latter firm propose to continue the business. The "Nova Scotian" and "Hibernian" have been fitted with refrigerators at a cost of \$1,200 each, and it is now proposed to fit up one in the "Grecian," thus providing facilities in each of these fortnightly boats from Halifax for the carriage of beef.—Chignecto Post.

It is reported that several London Missionary Society Missionaries and their wives have been massacred and probably eaten in New Guinea. It is to be hoped the report is false. But, if true, it shows that George Brown is needed in the locality where the massacre occurred. George Brown is a valiant Wesleyan missionary, who went with a band of native assistants from one of the Christianized South Sea Islands to evangelize a certain section of the population of New Guinea. He was tolerably well received at first, but one day in his absence the hungry heathen set about killing and eating Mr. Brown's local preachers. Mr. Brown on learning the fact took measures to put a stop to that sort of dead meat business. He organized a band, and armed it as well as he could, and swept down on the cannibals like an avalanche. Many of them were killed and the rest of them completely cowed. After that he pursued his work in peace with great success. Mr. Brown's peculiar method might not always succeed, but in this instance it worked like a charm.—News.
