

Mount Allison Defeat Saints For First Win

A penalty kick by team captain Les Davies early in the second half allowed the Mount Allison University rugby-football team to win their first game of the season as they defeated the league-leading Saint Dunstan's Varsity squad 2-0 at the S.D.U. gridiron on Saturday. It was a hard game for the Saints to lose as they widely outplayed the visitors in the first half and were threatening to score a try when their picking quarter lost control of the ball at Mount A's five yard line just before the game ended.

It was the first loss in four starts for the powerful Saints, who lead the Maritime Intercollegiate Rugby Union with three wins and one loss. For the Garnet and Gold men, it was their first win, which combined with a tie gives them three points. Donald Nicholson, of Summerside, rangy three-quarter player for the visitors, played a very strong game as he showed the best speed on the field and performed some of the hardest tackles. For the Saints, captain Paul Jay was the most valuable as he advanced his team several times on nice 25 yard runs.

FIRST SCORING CHANCE

Shortly after the game started, Lewis MacDonald picked up a pass near center of the field and carried it well into Mount A's end to give the Saints their first chance to score. The powerful men from across the water, eager for a win, held the Saints outside the five yard territory and finally drove them back to neutral ground. Between the Garnet and Gold men, Saints picked up two penalty kicks each of which Rodney McInnis booted wide of the goal posts on forty yard kicks.

Around the middle of the opening frame Saints started to press again as they gained forty yards on a nice passing-running combination which was stopped only inches from the visitors goal line. During this rush Bob Mooney made the first of his three tremendous first-half runs. As the Saints were pushed back, they were awarded two penalty kicks, one a 40 yarder from mid-field and the other a 25 yard angle drive. Both times the greasy ball went wild off the foot of full-back Jack Reardon. Both teams were wide of the goal posts on a penalty kick each near the end of the half with Mount A starting to show more ability all the time. Shortly before the half ended, Don Nicholson of the Garnet and Gold men picked up a pass and busted through the Saints' forward line to take 30 yards before

being hauled down just outside the opposing 25 yard line. It was the longest run of the encounter.

PENALTY KICK

The second half had no sooner started than Mount A. picked up a penalty kick from Saints' 25 yard line. Mount A. captain, Les Davies made no mistake as he easily belted the wet oval between the posts for the two points which won the game. Play was fairly even during the middle portion of this session with each team missing on several penalty drives. The play got quite rugged and tempers began to flare, but thanks to the capable refereeing of Gordon Bennett nothing serious developed.

At the 32 minute mark of the final frame, the Saints, led by captain Paul Jay, called in on the faltering opposition and brought the fans from their seats as Jay landed only inches away from the goal line with the ball. Several scrums were held during the following minutes with the Saints coming very close to scoring a try. However, as the ball broke loose from a scrum near the goal line with only a minute of play remaining, John Kelly of the Saints fumbled it just long enough to allow Don Nicholson to give it a boot and drive it into neutral ground. Don raced down the side, picked up the ball and almost got through for a clean breakaway.

Ian Rae, Bill Naylor and Charles MacLaughlin all played strong games for the visitors while Tom McGaugh, Gus Dorais and Arnold Mullins were strong for the Saints. The rain stopped shortly before the game started and left the field in fair shape. The absence of wind made it possible for both teams to make several fine passing and kicking plays. Both teams tangled in their second game of the season at Sackville this coming Saturday.

NEW YORK (CP) — Veteran Billy Mosenko, coaxed out of retirement this year to aid the cellar-dwelling Chicago Black Hawks, fired a goal from 30 feet out midway through the last period Sunday night to give the Hawks a 1-1 tie with New York Rangers in a National Hockey League game.

Mosenko's unassisted tally erased a 1-0 Ranger lead supplied by rookie Larry Popen in the second minute of the third period.
