Farmers' Club at Cardigan.

SUMMARY REPORT OF THE FIRST MEETING—
ADDRESSES BY GEORGE F. OWEN, ESQ.,
HON. DONALD FERGUSON, AND MR JAMES
D. DEWAR—THE CLUB ESTABLISHED.

Pursuant to notice a meeting was held
in Stewart's Hall, Cardigan Bridge, on
Thursday, the 10th November, inst., to
consider the desirability of forming an
Agricultural Society, in that section of the
County. Owing to the busy state of the
weather, the meeting was not very
well attended.

G. F. Owen explained his reasons for
calling the meeting, and having made a
few remarks on the usefulness of Agricul-
tural Societies in general, proposed, se-
conded by Donald Stewart, Esq., Cardigan,
that James D. Dewar, Esq., Brudenell,
be chairman of the meeting,—which was
adopted.

The Chairman having duly announced
the matter for discussion, waited an ex-
pression of opinion from those present.

Geo. F. Owen advocated the forming of
an Agricultural Society and said that by
having a Society formed, a club room
could be obtained where the farmers who
joined the club could meet together once a
week and discuss matters interesting to
their own profession; that newspapers and
magazines could be obtained at a small
cost to each member, and that by such
means much useful information could be
disseminated among the members of the
club; that once a month lectures or
public discussions on agricultural
questions might be arranged for and that
many other advantages would accrue from
the formation of such a Society. Hon. D.
Ferguson being present was called upon
to give his opinion on the question and in
an excellent address ably advocated the
formation of such societies. He said the
question of agricultural Education was
every day becoming of greater importance
and that the Farmers of every section of
the Island would do well to avail them-
selves of every opportunity of learning
more about their business. He instanced
the advance made in Continental Europe
in Dairying and showed how Danish and
Holstein Butter was commanding top
prices in the markets of Great
Britain, that in Denmark dairy maids
graduated at institutions expressly intended
to teach the art of butter making, and
through the diplomas obtained thereby are
readily engaged to manage large dairies.
He spoke of the success that had attended
the shipping of cattle and sheep to Eng-
land this present year, and said he believed
soon would have a regular line of steamers
engaged in that business, that in order to
avail ourselves of the opportunity of selling
in the English markets we must improve
our stock, as it had been clearly demon-
strated that only the best quality of cattle
could profitably be exported to that market,
that we must endeavor to improve our
exports, as in the markets of England we
will meet keen competition from all
quarters of the globe and that the best arti-
cle will always command the highest price.
He considered the formation of Agricul-
tural Societies would lead to the introduc-
tion of new and improved stock; for, where-
as few farmers can afford to pay \$50.00 for
a pure bred bull calf, a society could do so,
and the members of the club would have
the benefit of his service. He said he was
very glad to see a move made in this mat-
ter, and hoped that the society would be
very successful, and promised any help he
could give towards that object.

The Chairman being requested to give
his views on the question said he had
made a move in the same direction
some time last year and quoted
from a letter he had written in
the Patriot last June, advocating the
formation of farmers' clubs. He considered
that a society would be of great benefit,
and would support it. The following resolu-
tions were then carried unanimously:

Moved by George F. Owen, seconded by
J. McNeill, that this meeting considers it
desirable to form an Agricultural Society at
Cardigan Bridge.

Moved by Donald Stewart, Esq., se-
conded by Mr. John Smith, that the next
meeting be held on Thursday, the 1st day
of December next, and the hour of seven
o'clock, p. m.

Hon. D. Ferguson said that he would,
on that occasion, deliver a short address on
agriculture, and hoped to see the
society fairly organized.

After moving a vote of thanks to the
chairman, the meeting adjourned.—Com.

CANADA'S CATTLE TRADE.

Latest cable ad-
vices from Glasgow quote best qualities of
Canadian cattle at 7d. @ 7 1/2d., and Liverpool
prices were quoted at 7d. to 7 1/2d. per lb. live
weight. Regarding dressed beef, it is stated
that a considerable decline has lately been
experienced in Liverpool, where prices are
said to have fallen from 6d. two weeks ago to
3 1/2d. @ 4d. at the latter part of last week.
The shipments of cattle from Boston last week
were 416 head, against 662 for the week pre-
vious. Of dressed beef the shipments were
only 809 quarters against 1,382 qrs. for the
previous week. The first shipment of live
hogs from Boston for a long time was made
last week on the Sumatra, and numbered
240.—Halifax Herald.

THE Bishop of Manchester, commenting on
the conduct of the late Capt. Strachan, of the
Cyprian, who, when his vessel was going
down, gave the only life preserver he had to
a little stowaway, and lost his life in conse-
quence, said: "If this life were the end of
all things, if there was nothing beyond the
grave, perhaps they might say he (Captain
Strachan) was a fool. But if there was a
hereafter, and if self-sacrifice was a law of
Christian duty, he thought that man would
be one to whom the Lord of the Harvest

and faithful servant.' Well done, thou good
and faithful servant." Certain people say
selfishness prompts all good deeds. Where
was Capt. Strachan's selfishness?
