THE VENEZUELAN SETTLEMENT.

AMERICANS IN ENGLAND HAVE, we are told by a correspondent of the New York Times, been astonished at the matter-of-fact calm with which the English public received Lord Salisbury's announcement that the Venezuelan difficulty had been definitely arranged.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

In the course of a recent interview at Canton with a representative of the World to World President-elect McKinley regretted his inability to make any prophecy as to the results of any reciprocity negotiations.

With regard to the reported destination in Ireland, it is stated from a reliable source that although the local Irish authorities reported on the failure of the crops in many districts, the official view was that no serious or widespread famine was anticipated.

The Mail and Empire thinks it is time for the Toronto Globe to repeat its assertion that the French was not a serious one to get the Pope's endorsement of the terms of the settlement of the school question, for some of the French papers of the Lower Empire have been repeating their accusations.

NEWS NOTES.

Further outbreaks of hog cholera are reported from western Ontario. An Ottawa manufacturer has contracted to send sixty Canadian made buggies to the transit.

The town of Mercer, seven miles south of Erie, Pa., was swept by fire a few nights ago. The loss is estimated at \$200,000.

The Bohemian Athletic Club, New York, has offered \$25,000 for a 20 round contest between Corbett and Fitzsimmons.

The Chamber, N. B., Town Council have purchased a Renault steam fire engine with two hose carts and heater. The outfit cost \$3,200.

Hon. Mr. Fisher will leave for Washington in a few days to endeavor to induce the American authorities to remove the ninety days quarantine regulations.

The Winnipeg Board of Trade is arranging for a convention of the businessmen of Manitoba and the Northwest. It will be held at Winnipeg in February.

Japan is preparing an official account of the war with China, written up by its general staff. The naval and military adventures will be published in separate parts.

Seventy thousand people, it is estimated, went to see the great New York horse show. No such crowd has that ever gathered at a bicycle meet.

The parents of the late wife of J. Reginald Hooper, for whose murder he is suffering life imprisonment, have petitioned for his release, being convinced that he did not murder their daughter.

Advices from Montreal state that Capt. Desile of the Tiber, charged with manslaughter in causing the sinking of the schooner Maggie at St. John's, N.C., has been released on \$20,000 bail.

During the fiscal year 1895-96, 343,627 immigrants arrived in the United States, 31,789 over the preceding year. Of these 2,199 were returned for failing below the standard with respect to this world's goods.

After three years' hard labor and the expenditure of between \$15,000,000 and \$16,000,000, New Orleans has finally completed the great undertaking of changing its street railroad motive power from the old-fashioned mule to electricity.

From Manila, Philippines, comes a report that the Spaniards have suffered a reverse while attacking the rebel position at Novales on Nov. 8, the rebels being strongly fortified. Another attack was made on Nov. 11, when the Spaniards were repulsed, with a reported loss of 200 men.

Five horseless carriages started on Saturday in a race from London to Brighton. There are in England fifteen motor factories, one of which employs a thousand men. It is evident that the old road horse is doomed before long to see some queer sights as he makes his daily journey.

Cuban leaders at Tampa, Fla., have received information that the insurgent battles fought on the island during the present war. The battle was in Pinar Del Rio, but no details are given. The Cubans are rejoicing as this is the first real battle since Weyler took the field.

A Copenhagen anarchist has been arrested having in his possession photographs of all the leading European secret police agents, with descriptions of their manner of working and other details showing an intimate knowledge of the machinery of the fighting anarchism. There has not been a clearer case of traiting the traitor for a long time.

The London Telegraph devotes an article to a description of a graceful and charming present of fruit for the Queen from Hamilton, Ontario, which arrived at the Canadian office in London a few days ago. Sir Donald Smith, the Canadian high commissioner, personally attended to the disposal of the gift in accordance with the Queen's wishes.

Mr. Greenway comes east shortly in connection with the new inducements for the Icelandic immigration. There is a large colony in Manitoba already and they are about as prosperous and contented a class as can be found in the whole province. The financial condition of the Island of Iceland at the present very hard on the inhabitants. The Manitoba and Dominion authorities will co-operate in the matter to bring as many Icelanders to Canada as possible.

The Chicago Journal publishes a column article concerning the alleged discovery of a vegetable powder which, it is asserted, will revolutionize transportation methods. The powder when mixed with water forms an electric battery, one cell of which is said to be strong enough to run half a dozen incandescent lights. With two cells a portable light is claimed. The inventor is claimed to be made from the roots of a common plant, the name of which is kept secret, awaiting a patent.

This year's raw sugar supply of the world surpasses that of 1895, notwithstanding the enormous Cuban deficit, according to official statistics received from Russia. The official Russian estimate of the world's raw sugar production for this year is as follows: Production of beet sugar, 4,960,000 tons; production of cane sugar, 2,655,000 tons; total stock on hand, 1,150,000 tons; total, 8,765,000 tons. Last year the corresponding total was 8,290,000 tons.

Thomas A. Edison has verified the experiments reported to have been made in San Francisco which by means of the cathode ray a blind boy has been enabled to distinguish light. Edison experimented on two subjects, both blind, from Newark, N. J. Many tubes were tried, each with increased strength, and finally the subjects were able to distinguish flashes. One of the men was able after a time to say when the light was turned on and off. The most successful results were obtained with the aid of a red globe, and it is Edison's intention to continue experimenting in this line until much more satisfactory results are arrived at, which he confidently predicts will be soon.

SPAIN MAY MAKE WAR

At No Distant Day Spain May Declare War Against the United States.

Mr Charles Akers, the London Times' correspondent in Cuba, speaking of the situation in that island stated that from a military point of view the trouble seemed to be that the Spanish troops did not follow up advantages gained. In the earlier stages of the insurrection when the Spanish funds were more plentiful, the commissariat arrangements were fairly satisfactory. Now it is said, and is fairly well substantiated, that the national troops to start out from their fortified places on an expedition with only a limited quantity of ammunition and rations. It is the exception when they carry supplies sufficient to last for more than three days. The troops make a dash on the insurgents, and, whether victorious or unsuccessful retire to their camps at the end of two or three days. Formerly they were able to live on the country. This they cannot now do, as the territory they make forages in can furnish no food, and the troops must subsist on the rations they carry. As the Spanish soldiers, Mr Akers says, that generally speaking, they are young men who were mostly mobilized in Spain and hurried off to Cuba. They are lacking in discipline and training; few of them are good shots, and the ranks are filled with men who raise the bats to the shoulder or without taking aim.

In the course of his conversation on Mr. Akers expressed the belief that in case a limited agreement was made between the United States and Spain looking to the purchase of Cuba, it was among the probabilities that at no distant day Spain would declare war against America. He spoke on the point calmly but seriously, and without bias. He said that statements in this connection might at first seem sensational, but that when the facts became known as he knew them, the early possibility, if not probability, of a hostile declaration by Spain would be apparent. He declared that close observation in Spain showed that the temper of the people of that Kingdom was unmistakably unfriendly to this country. He went further and added that Spanish sentiment was rapidly becoming decidedly hostile to the United States. He does not regard the Spanish Government as being in this attitude. On the contrary, he thinks that the party in power is amicably disposed toward this country. But the people are hostile.

The London News claims on what it declares to be reliable authority, that the powers are considering a scheme for the financial control of Turkey under European control. It says that Sir Edgar Vincent, an Englishman, who is Governor of the Imperial Ottoman Bank, has been mentioned for the Ministry of Finance. A Russian officer will probably be Minister of War and a Frenchman Minister of the Interior. The Grand Vicer will remain President of the Council of State. The appointments are being submitted to the Powers. It is understood that the heads of the scheme are:

First, the raising of a loan of £5,000,000 and the placing of the police under European control.

Second, a reduction of the army.

Third, each vilayet to have a European receiver, who shall be answerable to the Minister of Finance for collecting taxes and paying salaries.

Fourth, a complete revision of the civil and military lists, and the removal of any officers who have been convicted of crimes or who are otherwise unfit for office.

Fifth, an entire reorganization of the gendarmerie.

Sixth, no person to be debarred from holding office because of his religion.

Seventh, all communities to have equal rights.

The scheme aims to maintain the integrity of the Empire, but does not necessarily presuppose the retention of Abdul Hamid as Sultan.

THE TARIFF ENQUIRY.

Manufacturers Say That a Change in the Tariff Will Close Them Up.

The tariff commission began work in Toronto on Wednesday. The representatives of the various industries appeared before Sir Richard Cartwright, Sir Oliver Mowat, Hon. Mr. Fielding and Hon. Mr. Paterson, and expressed their views of the tariff, etc.

A. E. Kemp, manufacturer of enamel ware, did not ask for any change in industry, but expressed his belief that Canadians can compete with other nations if fraudulent valuations are prevented.

Mr. Gillet, manufacturing chemist, employs 50 hands in his laboratory and has ten travellers. He will remove his plant to Chicago, whence he came, if the duty on goods of his class is reduced.

Mr. Thomas, of the Lozier Bicycle Co., and Messrs. Evans and Dodge, of the "E" and "D" Company, stated that the tariff made no difference to the bicycle industry. The manufacturers in white wear said a reduction would close them up.

The dry goods men were not agreed on details.
