

Hughes And Balbo Win Wrestling Tag Match At The Forum

The heroes overcame the villains last night as Len "Cowboy" Hughes and Sal Balbo teamed up to defeat Rasputin, the Russian Bear and Tiny Mills in a wild body slinging team tag wrestling match at the Forum.

Sal Balbo defeated Rasputin in the first individual match on the card and the "Cowboy" the big favorite with the crowd defeated Tiny Mills in the second match.

Rasputin and Balbo were the two principals in the ring at the start of the tag team wrestling. Hughes soon replaced Balbo and shortly afterwards Rasputin was replaced by Mills. The wrestlers kept alternating with their partners at various intervals during the bout.

The opponents threw everything that was and was not in the books at one another. Kneeing, elbowing and drop kicking were but mild forms of punishment and a few sneak punches on the back of the neck or the kidneys by Rasputin brought the greatest delight to the Russian Bear as he guffawed while his opponent squirmed on the canvas.

At one point the "Cowboy" got so vicious that he chased the big Mills out of the ring. At the end Rasputin won the first fall with a bear hug on Sal Balbo at 19:40.

The second bout was the shortest of the night. Hughes and Mills started it off and soon Mills was whittled off by Rasputin. Then with a vicious series of dropkicks and combination work, by Hughes and Balbo the Russian Bear was forced to the canvas for the third fall at 5:12. Rasputin and Balbo faced one another for the start of the third bout. After some vicious body blocking and arm locking the wrestlers were replaced by their

partners. Hughes and Mills continued their rough tactics and Hughes threw Mills over his head so hard that the big fellow broke the boards of the ring.

But in the end Rasputin and Mills by their tactics defeated themselves. Hughes had an arm and headlock on Mills and was in the centre of the ring with his back to Rasputin. The Russian Bear, however, broke the rules and jumped into the ring and was sneaking up behind Hughes to deliver a punch.

Suddenly Hughes whirled and spun Mills with him. Rasputin's punch instead of hitting Hughes struck Mills and laid out his partner. Hughes then jumped on Mills and won the third fall. As Mills came too he and Rasputin went wild. They threatened the referee and gestured wildly at the fans.

Balbo was awarded the win over Rasputin in the first individual match at 16:21. Rasputin was disqualified for manhandling the referee.

Tiny Mills, wearing black jeans, was pinned to the mat by Hughes at 11:03 in the second match. Hughes knocked Mills over the referee and then pinned him down. Referee Fred Hayter, Halifax; announcer, W. H. Beaton; timer, Dr. F. C. Dugan.

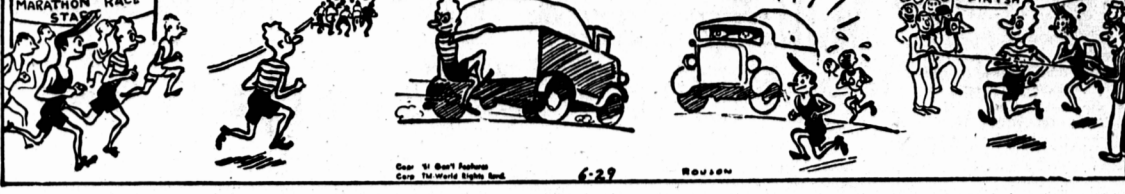

The pennant races in both leagues tightened Thursday as New York Yankees closed within a half game of Chicago in the American League and New York Giants pulled within five lengths of Brooklyn Dodgers.

Cliff Mape's three-run pinch double in the eighth inning gave the Yanks a 3-0 victory over Washington and the opportunity to gain on the White Sox who were rained out of their game with Detroit.

The Giants gained a full game on Brooklyn by nipping the Dodgers 5-4 on Monte Irvin's three-run homer, his second home run of the day, in the eighth inning. That blast made up for three errors by Giant third baseman Hank Thompson. The bobbles permitted two Dodgers to score and set up a third run.

In the majors' only other daylight contest, Philadelphia's Phillies edged Boston 3-2 in the 10th inning on a wild throw to home by Roy Hartsfield.

Veteran Sid Hudson of Washington wilted in the 90-degree heat after hurling three-hit ball through the first seven frames. Over that stretch he faced only 22 batters, one over regulation.

Upsets Feature English Tennis Championships

WIMBLEDON, England, June 28 (AP)—Betting favorite Jaroslav Drobný and ninth-seeded Gardner Mulloy were dumped from the all-British England lawn tennis championships today in startling third-round upsets.

Drobný, a 3 to 1 choice to win his first Wimbledon title, bowed to Tony Mottram of the British Davis Cup team, 5-7, 6-4, 2-6, 7-5, 8-6.

Mulloy, the 37-year-old Miami lawyer, never had the right answer against steady Fausto Gardini, a slender 21-year-old Italian law student from Milan, and lost, 7-5, 6-6, 6-4, 6-4.

With defending champion Budge Patty ousted Wednesday, only seven of the original 10 seeded players will enter the round of 16.

Henri Rochon of Montreal and Yvon Debroe of France put up an unexpectedly stiff fight before losing their second-round singles match to Gardner Mulloy and Dick Savitt, 6-2, 7-5, 6-2.

The losers at one time led the Americans 4-2 in the second set.

It was the first time in many years that a Canadian had appeared on the centre court. A near-capacity crowd applauded Rochon for several brilliant volleys.

"Gump" Gillis started on the mound for the Falcons and Merlin McKenzie for the Anchors but neither were destined to stay around very long. Cliff Ready stayed on the mound in the fifth and was the winner. Burke pitched the game in the fifth, was the loser.

The Falcons appeared to be sailing for an easy win in the early part of the game. They were leading 5-0 at the end of the third and 5-1 at the end of the fourth but then the roof fell in on Gillis.

Buck Whitlock was the leading batsman with two triples and a double in five tries. Glen Matheson, celebrating his return to the Anchors, had a home run and a single in four trips. Brian Lewis and "Coker" Pneau each had two hits in five appearances.

A total of three double plays were pulled off. Whitlock and Ready figured in two of them and Ryan and McKnight in the other. McKnight's pick of Larter's hard hit ball and the running catches of Matheson and McKenzie on long ones by Whitlock were the top fielding plays of the game.
