

# Good Harvests Will Boost Employment Across Canada

**CANADIAN PRESS**—Prospects for fall harvest employment in Canada look good this year.

A Canadian Press survey shows that at least 25,000 extra harvesters will be needed—2,000 in British Columbia, 15,000 in the Prairies, 5,000 in Ontario and 3,000 in Quebec and the Maritimes.

Most of the 25,000 will be employed at only peak-time periods, and most will be recruited from the districts in which they are needed.

Agriculture officials in the West say about the same number of harvesters will be brought in from the East as last year. Saskatchewan expects to need 700 and Alberta about 800.

**LATE IN SASKATCHEWAN**

In Saskatchewan, where spring flooding this year held wheat seeding to 13,281,000 acres—the lowest since 1944—about 10,000 extra workers will be needed to work on the province's 100,000 farms. Most of them will be recruited from Saskatchewan.

Despite the spring flooding, generally adequate moisture and a warm summer have combined to rapidly mature what appears to be a good crop, department of agriculture officials said. Harvesting will be late in many districts.

Farmers already have hired about 200 men from the East. The Saskatchewan department says

There has been a trend during the last few years for farmers to take up over last year and there are prospects of a bumper apple crop. A good apple crop also is forecast for Nova Scotia. The yield this year should be about 3,500,000 bushels. About 700 to 800 extra pickers will be required but all are expected to come from inside the province. Most of those hired are off-season fishermen. And unemployment in the coal mines has filled the labor market.

Newfoundland reports no extra labor will be needed for its harvest. The only hiring done is for a few days when retired or semi-retired men are taken on for \$5 a day plus their meals.

**ALBERTA ACREAGE UP**

Alberta's crop acreage is up to 15,467,000 compared with 15,150,000 in 1954. Wheat acreage is down two per cent from last season and rye 19 per cent, but oats and barley are 10 and 20 per cent greater, the department of agriculture says.

The department estimated that about 12 per cent more men will be needed from the East than last year's 700. Most of them came from Ontario.

**SOUTHPORT, Eng. (Reuters)**—Mrs. Emily Ross of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada explained to British trade union leaders here Tuesday why Canadian unions oppose unrestricted immigration.

She was speaking at a fraternal delegate to the 37th British Trades Union Congress attended by 900 delegates from 183 unions.

Mrs. Ross, 56, from Edmonton, herself emigrated to Canada from Yorkshire 35 years ago.

Mrs. Ross, international representative of the 1,000,000 United Garment Workers of America, said: "Some of you may think that Canada is a place where workers from Britain and other countries should go."

"We of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada insist that Canada must follow a policy of very select immigration."

"We cannot justify the encouragement of new immigrants to come to Canada when there are no jobs or opportunities of employment to offer them."

**ONTARIO'S SUMMER DRY**

Exceptionally dry summer weather in Ontario cut the need for a good part of the extra help usually hired in August. The dry conditions made it possible for farmers and their families to work day after day without interruption.

The fruit crop, earlier somewhat damaged by hurricanes, is expected to be about average and should produce a big need for workers, agriculture officials say. Employment officials expect the majority will be students and adult vacationers.

Vacancies exist in the tobacco areas but none of the crop has been lost because of the shortage.

**GOOD QUEBEC CROPS**

The Quebec government does not compile statistics on agriculture and farm employment and no accurate estimate of the temporary labor help needed is available.

However, a department of agriculture official said crops are good this year and the yield is expected to be about the same as last year. The yields of potatoes, sweet corn

**U.S.N. - R.C.N. 7-Day Exercise**

NORFOLK, Va. (AP)—A 35-ship naval force, made up of United States and Canadian units, will rendezvous off Norfolk Wednesday for a seven-day simulated convoy run to Gibraltar.

The operation, called New Broom IV, is designed to develop further the teamwork of Canadian and United States units in anti-submarine warfare, a spokesman for Atlantic Fleet headquarters explained. New Broom IV is the fourth such operation staged by the two countries in the last four years.

Taking part will be 11 Canadian ships, 24 U.S. ships and aviation squadrons of both countries.

**Registration At Montague School Passes 400 Mark**

Over 400 students are registered at the Montague school which got underway last week for another school term. Fourteen rooms are in operation in the 12-graded school, with double grades in eleven and ten, which have a total enrollment of 40 and 38 respectively. Thirty students are registered in grade twelve and it is quite possible that next year will see a double grade twelve at Montague. 35 new pupils have registered in grade one providing a considerably larger grade for one teacher to look after. The largest enrollment to date is in grade two where 42 pupils are being taught in one grade.

The High School from grade nine to twelve has an enrollment of 130, with the remainder in the Elementary grades. Grades eight to twelve are located in the new High School, necessitating the use of one room in the auditorium. The other seven grades are in the Memorial School with one grade in the basement room.

It is also worthy of note that the new tile floor in the Memorial School has been completed by Mr. D. M. MacDonald, and this will make a great difference not only to the appearance of the interior of the school, but more important to the health of the children.
