

# Seminar Delegates Hear Report On United Nations

Various world views on United Nations, a report on what has been accomplished by this organization, a review of Canada's participation, and an outlook towards the future of the U.N. were presented by Heath MacQuarrie, M.P. for Queens County, and Canadian representative to the United Nations Assembly, speaking last night to delegates from P.E.I. boards of trade attending a day-long seminar on executive training, in Summerside.

Mr. MacQuarrie, making an overnight visit by air from Ottawa for the purpose of reporting on the U.N., pictured the organization as a world instrument through which nations

could work towards their natural desire for the betterment of mankind. Recalling steps in this direction through the ages, he pointed out that more recently the United Nations was more practical, efficient, and workable organization than had been its predecessor, the league of nations.

Citing the co-operation of nations in their recognition of the postage stamp in the transmission of mails through various countries to distant destinations, he pictured the possibilities that exist through an expansion of other forms of co-operation between nations, and touched on the specialized agencies of United Nations which are functioning on many fronts. He noted the activities of the UN's different departments, which were concerned with such things as disarmament, human rights, international laws, economic and technical assistance to underdeveloped countries, and more recently, the organization of a committee to study matters relating to outer space.

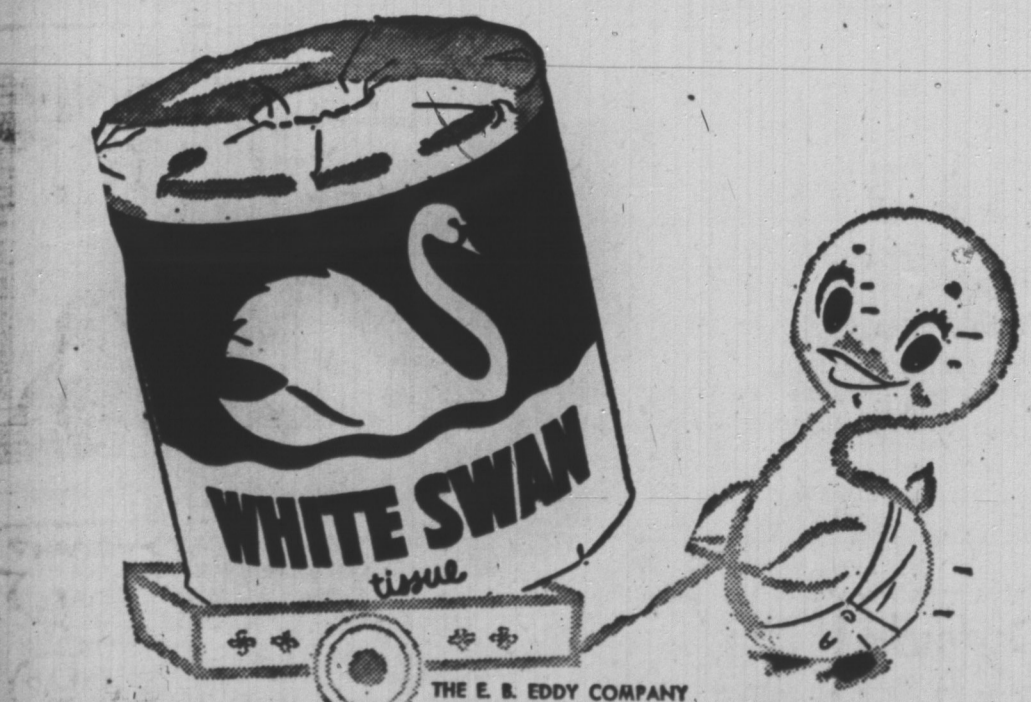

The National Film Board office in Charlottetown, showed the film to members of various boards of trade in P. E. I. who were attending a day-long seminar workshop in Summerside.

Made in color the film is a satire on the need for courtesy towards visiting tourists. While making the point that the tourist industry is a multi-million dollar business for Canada, with more than 30 million people visiting Canada last year, the film illustrates the unfavorable reaction of tourists to such things as careless service station attendants, motel service which neglects the personal touch, towns without adequate directional signs, of restaurants lacking distinctive menus and polite service.

Chief White said the stolen articles had not yet been recovered. Magistrate R. S. Hinton presided.

# Famed Bomber Bids Farewell To RCAF Station, Summerside

**SUMMERSIDE** — Last night at RCAF Station, Summerside, the unparalleled Lancaster bomber of Second World War fame, roared its final farewell to Maritime operations, and the Summerside air station.

The last group of Maritime operational training unit's four engine servants left Summerside at midnight last night. This group of Lanc's were flown to Calgary, Alberta, where they will be transferred to Air Material Command for storage.

One of the most famous aircraft of the Second World War,

the Lancaster was converted for Maritime operational flying in 1949 with the formation of Number 2 Maritime Operational Training Unit at Greenwood, Nova Scotia.

The first crews trained on the Maritime Lancs formed the nucleus of 405 (Maritime Patrol) Squadron in early 1950. This squadron was joined on Maritime patrol operations, by 404 Squadron later in the same year. Before takeoff the crews were briefed on weather conditions between Summerside and Calgary, by forecaster Dave Strang of the

department of transport, who is attached to the Summerside base. The commanding officer, Group Captain J. E. Creeper, D.F.C., C.D., sat in on the briefing conducted by the pilot leader of the flight, F/L Lloyd Hetherington. The other aircraft captains were Wing Commander L. W. C. Limpert, and F/L Robert Magee.
