Famished Convicts End 77-Hour Rebellion

TRENTON, N. J., April 21—(AP)—Sixty-nine famished convicts, who held out in a barricaded print shop of Trenton State Prison for 77 hours, ended their rebellion Friday.

But in a companion mutiny in Railway State Prison Farm, 40 miles to the north, 231 prisoners defied authorities and held up in a dormitory wing. They seized the wing last night in sympathy with the Trenton rioters, and held nine prison guards as hostages.

It was the fifth prison disturbance in the state in three weeks. The Trenton convicts—weak but surly after four days with almost no food and water—surrendered at 3:25 p. m. EST. Three prison employees they had held as hostages were whisked out a side door of the prison and sent home in the warden's automobile. They are in good condition.

The convicts demanded the firing of Warden William H. Carly and an investigation of the prison by an impartial outside body.

Carly's only concession to them was to call in representatives of the Osborne Association, a foundation interested in prison problems to hear the convicts' side of the story.

The gang of convicts took over the print shop Tuesday, holding four employees as hostages. One of them, Oris Robison, was released last night after he suffered a mild heart attack.

August B. Doak, 36-year-old kidnapper serving a life term, and William Dickens, 38-year-old robber serving a 12-to-21 year sentence, were identified by prison officials as ringleaders of the revolt.

At Rahway, prison officials said news of the Trenton capitulation would be sent in to the defang-prisoners in the hope of breaking their spirit.

OVERCOMES SHORTAGE

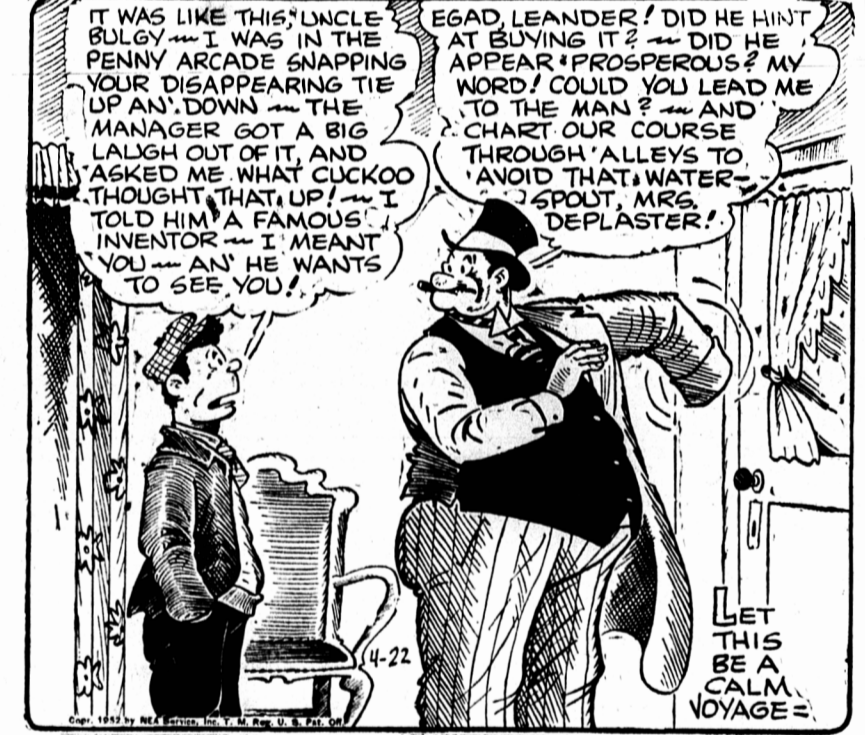
