Local and Other Items.

A GOOD HAIL.—The St. John Sun says that one fisherman hauled in 420 smelts at Torriburn, one afternoon last week.

IMPERIAL STATESMEN.—Mr. L. H. Davies, M. P., lectured on "Imperial Statesmen," in the Institute, St. John, on Monday evening last.

THE BEAR RECORD.—Following is the record of bears slain in Maine in 1888 as compiled by Clerk Abel Russell, in the Secretary of State's office: Aroostook, 120; Franklin, 18; Hancock, 24; Oxford, 23; Penobscot, 79; Piscataquis, 6; Somerset, 31; Waldo, 1; Washington, 52; total 351. For each of these bears the State Treasurer pays a bounty of \$5.

WAIT AWHILE.—Dr. Bourinot, Clerk of the Dominion House of Commons, delivered a lecture on Friday last in Trinity College, Toronto. His subject was "The National Development of Canada." The Dr. seems to think that Imperial Federation is undesirable, that Annexation is distasteful, that Canada is not yet ready for independence, and that our political potatoes should be allowed to grow a while longer before we dig them up.

DOUBLY BEREAVED.—On the 24th, Canon Brigstocke was called to mourn the death of his son, George Augustus Selwyn, and yesterday Canon DeVeber, who officiated in his stead in Trinity, announced that another son, a student at Windsor, had been taken away—both of the same dread disease, scarlet fever. The general sympathy of the community is extended to the rector of Trinity and Mrs. Brigstocke in this double bereavement.—St. John Sun.

ROUGH PASSAGE.—The steamer Damara arrived at Halifax on Friday morning from London, after a passage of 19 days. Captain Dixon reports a succession of strong gales, with tremendous seas which broke over the decks. On Monday week they encountered a gale, accompanied by a blinding snow storm, during which one of the light houses was damaged and compass broken. This was the only damage sustained, and speaks volumes for the staunchness of the vessel and the efficiency of her commander.

BONDS AND GAS STOCK.—In St. John, N. B., on Saturday last, T. B. Hanington sold a \$700 city water 6 per cent. bond due 1915 at 20 1/2 per cent premium; \$1473 city water 6 per cent. bond, due 1912, at 10 1/2 per cent. premium; \$300 St. John bridge and railway extension 6 per cent. bond, due 1898, at par; 3 shares Bank of New Brunswick stock at 118 per cent. premium; \$2000 province of Nova Scotia 4 per cent. bonds, 36 years to run, at 1/2 per cent. premium; ten shares St. John gas stock, withdrawn at 26 per cent. premium.—St. John Sun.

AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.—During the recent session of the Provincial Farmers' Association at Fredericton, N. B., the Maritime Province ex-students of the Ontario Agricultural College organized a society for the discussion of the various branches of advanced agriculture and agricultural sciences. Mr. P. C. Black, A. O. A. C. of Falmouth, N. S., was elected President, and Mr. B. Eaton Patterson, B. S. A., of St. John, N. B., Secretary. All Maritime Province ex-students will be considered members. The next meeting will be at Truro, N. S., in March, during the convention of the Nova Scotia Dairymen's Association.

DOWN A TOBOGGAN SLIDE ON A BICYCLE.—One of the most daring feats of coasting ever attempted on a bicycle was accomplished the other afternoon in West Orange, N. J., by Mrs. J. S. Morehouse, wife of an Orange Valley druggist, and Miss Murford, of Newark. Both are expert riders. They went to the slide of the Essex County Toboggan Club on a fine long, and so steep that toboggans make the descent at the rate of about a mile a minute. The women mounted their machines at the top of the incline, and without using the brake or pedals slid toward the bottom at lightning speed. The slightest swerve would have sent the machines over the edge of the chutes, and a probably fatal accident would have resulted. They returned to the top again and made a second trip without accident. A third time they returned to the crest of the hill, and were contemplating another trip, but the crowd had gathered and they withdrew.

Silver Jubilee of M. Fabbe F. VanBlerk, Cure of Bloomfield, P. E. Island.

On Wednesday last there took place at Bloomfield a joyous feast; 'twas the Silver Jubilee of M. Fabbe Felix VanBlerk, cure of the parish. The well-known modesty of the cure of Bloomfield caused him to conceal from the public the fact that the 16th of January was the twenty-fifth anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood; but knowing full well that his conferees would never forgive him if he allowed the date to pass without their knowledge, he decided, at the eleventh hour, to give them notice, and, as consequence, only the Revs. D. McDonald, Tignish, S. A. Picotte, Palmer Road, and A. E. Burke, Alberton, were present.

M. Fabbe VanBlerk is a native of Belgium, and before coming into the diocese of Charlottetown, was an active member of the clergy of the diocese of Arichat under Bishop McKinnon. He is one of the worthiest of our Island priests. A true and sincere friend, a pious priest, an excellent administrator, in a word a very model of a country pastor. When he took charge of Bloomfield the parish was disorganized and incumbered with debt; he has made of it one of the most flourishing of the diocese of Charlottetown. He never tires in his efforts to better his people either spiritually or temporally. He is ready night and day to exercise the ministry to which he has been called for the glory of God and the salvation of souls. Father VanBlerk is a learned priest, excelling especially in his knowledge of the classics.

Certainly if his parishioners, in whose interests he has worked so well, and who justly esteem and venerate him as their well-beloved father, were aware that he celebrated the twenty-fifth anniversary of his priesthood on the 16th, they would have made a demonstration in every way worthy of so good a pastor.

At the banquet, the priests present spoke of the amicable relations which always existed between them and their good neighbor, the cure of Bloomfield, and praised his many good qualities of head and heart. Father VanBlerk, moved almost to tears, made a very touching reply. The general prayer in which the Monitor joins most heartily was that the good Cure might live to hear the chiming of the golden bells of his 50th anniversary in the priesthood.

His clerical friends presented him with a beautiful souvenir, and he received many messages of congratulation from the land of his birth.

The Conquest of Mexico.

In Mr. A. A. Bartlett's lecture on "The Conquest of Mexico," the audience assembled in St. James' Hall last evening enjoyed a very delightful treat. Mr. Bartlett first drew a graphic sketch of the country and its highly civilized heathen people before Cortez set upon it his invading foot. Then he referred to the proud and commanding position of Spain under Ferdinand and Isabella, and the wonderful exploits of her brave and brilliant cavaliers. And then he proceeded with the thrilling tale of the Spanish invasion of Mexico, showing how the daring and indomitable spirit of Cortez, aided by a handful of soldiers with gun powder and horses, prevailed against and overthrew a powerful and warlike nation, divided against itself, ruled by the superstitious and vacillating Montezuma, and impressed with the idea that the invader was the "Fair God," whose advent the people had been taught to expect. The horrible wholesale butcheries of the invaders; the abominable sacrificial rites of the invaded; the determination, energy and skillful policy of Cortez; the heroic courage, ability and devotion of Guatamzin, who, all too late, succeeded to the imperial throne of the Aztecs,—were carefully and powerfully portrayed by Mr. Bartlett. Considering that it was his first attempt on the platform, the lecture on The Conquest of Mexico reflects upon Mr. Bartlett the highest credit. In style it was chaste and easy; and it was very well delivered.

The audience listened with almost breathless attention, and at the close rewarded him by a genuine burst of applause—as well as the usual vote of thanks.

The Largest War Ship.

The Re Umberto, lately launched for the Italian Government, is one of the largest war vessels in the world, her displacement being 13,295 tons, or 1,253 tons more than the Trafalgar of the Nile. She is 400 feet long by 76 feet 9 inches broad, and draws 29 feet of water. The armor on her batteries is 19 inches thick, and she is fitted with a 3 inch steel protective deck as well. Her main armament will be four 104 ton guns and twelve of 4 1/2 tons, while her engines are expected to give a speed of 18 knots.
