NEW DELHI (Reuters) — George Drew, Canadian high commissioner in London, said here considerable progress has been made in the Commonwealth education program since the first Commonwealth Education Conference was held at Oxford in 1959.

Addressing the second Commonwealth Education Conference being attended by about 180 delegates from 13 countries, he said:

"As this program carries on, in every one of the Commonwealth countries there will be many well-trained people who have not only acquired special educational qualifications but who also can speak with understanding and knowledge of other parts of the Commonwealth they have visited."

Drew, who heads the Canadian delegation, told the conference that under the program a large number of Commonwealth scholars and students had come to Canada.

WILL OFFER MUCH

The total number of these persons may be small in relation to the population of the Commonwealth, he said, "but we should not underestimate the importance of the contribution many of them will make in the public life of their own countries."

Drew said the strength of the Commonwealth "lies in the fact there are no formal bonds and that our association is one based upon free choice which in itself is an expression of our belief in freedom of the individual."

Prime Minister Nehru, officially opening the conference, said the only way available to nations, groups and individuals in the world is the way of understanding and tolerance and not dominance by one continent or nation over others.
