## Rear-Admiral Declares Navy Is In Top Shape

HALIFAX (CP)—Rear-Admiral Hugh F. Pullen, deeply tanned and sprightly alert at 52, met here Monday morning in his first official day as new flag officer of the Atlantic Coast.

He announced happily, "the navy's in first class shape."

Admiral Pullen, who replaced Rear-Admiral R. E. S. Howland, foresaw no immediate changes for the Canadian navy's largest command.

"Our boys are on their toes. There's sparkle in their eyes and we have lots of enthusiasm to maintain our high standards," he said.

**HAIR-RAISING THREAT**  
Only once during the press conference in his office did he sound an ominous note. He called the submarine threat "quite hair-raising" but advised "I would not allow ourselves to panic or get frightened."

He called for "wholehearted support and certain understanding."

He said destroyer escort ships of the St. Laurent class are designed to cope with the submarine threat.

"But finding a submarine is sometimes like looking for a needle in the hay stack."

**MR. NAVY**  
Admiral Pullen, who comes from a sea-faring family, could almost be tabbed Mr. Navy. Two of his great uncles won recognition for surveys in northern waters.

His brother Capt. T. C. Pullen is skipper of the Canadian ice-breaker Labrador which recently made history by charting a deep-sea draught channel in the Bellot Strait, opening a new passage for ships.

Admiral Pullen expects to meet the Labrador Oct. 8 off the Newfoundland coast and return here with his brother. He says of the Labrador, "the ship has conducted herself with the greatest credit to Canada and the world."

**BUILDS MODELS**  
Admiral Pullen's real mark as a sailor reflects in his hobby as a model ship builder. Twelve of his models are on display at the Maritime museum which he helped establish on Citadel Hill.

He says building ship models, ironically enough the non-naval type, comes naturally. "I was building models since I was old

enough to wield a pen knife with-out carving myself to pieces." His favorite model is that of a lancook whaler "because it required a lot of effort."

One of his reasons for building non-naval type models was "try to preserve in some tangible way replicas of these old-time ships that are fast fading from the scene."

For his first official day "on the job," Admiral Pullen made personal visits to government, civic and church leaders. A native of Oakville, Ont., he is no stranger to Halifax.

He was at one-time in his career in charge of the gunnery school and armament depot here. He was flag officer of the Pacific Coast before receiving its appointment to the Atlantic Command.
