Everything passed off pleasantly—the greatest harmony prevailing during the day. The Rev. Pastor of St. Mary's Parish, aided by an active and energetic Committee, deserve great credit for the manner in which the arrangements were carried out.

HARVESTING.—Many farmers throughout the country are still engaged at harvesting. The grain this season has been unusually slow in ripening. The yield will be, nevertheless, more than the average. Farmers, this year, have shown wisdom in sowing wheat abundantly instead of oats as formerly. In an agricultural country like this we should surely endeavor to produce our own breadstuffs—enough and to spare.

FOUND GUILTY OF MURDER.—The trial of Clark Brown, the West Winchester murderer, was concluded on Saturday evening. The jury, after short deliberation, brought in a verdict of guilty. The prisoner was then sentenced to be hanged on the 21st Oct.—[Clark Brown, it will be remembered, was arrested on suspicion as being the murderer of his father and sister, and confessed to the crime.]

TEA ADVANCING.—We are informed that owing to a short crop of tea in China, and the fact that tea floats as well as stocks in England are less than at the same period last year, tea has advanced in London about two pence per lb. on the ordinary grades which go into consumption here. Teas have been cheap for several years past, or lower than they are likely to be for a year or two to come. It is said that the Russians have recently bought some parcels of the lower grades in the English market, which has helped to stimulate sales there.—*St. John Sun.*

POTATOES, ETC., FOR ENGLAND.—The price of this article of the food supply has risen considerably in price recently in England, owing to the almost entire failure of the potato crop in England, Holland and Belgium. It is of importance to the farmers and shippers of New Brunswick to know that facilities are arranged by which they can make shipments to this new market. Messrs. Stevenson & Co., of 55 Victoria street, Liverpool, who are Canadians of good standing, have for some time been engaged in handling Canadian produce, and are prepared to advance 50 per cent. of the cost here upon potatoes shipped by steamer. We hear that oysters may also be very profitably shipped to England at present.—*St. John Tel.*

The conference appointed between the authorities of the New York State and the Ontario Government met for the consideration of the feasibility of the Niagara Falls International Park scheme on the 30th ult. They were present from the Ontario Government the Hon. Messrs. Mowat, Fraser, Hardy and Purdy. Among the New York State Commissioners were Governor Dorsheimer and Secretary of State Surry Gardner. There were also present Prof. Umpstead, the well-known, park designer; Mr. A. G. Hill, of Clifton, and the representatives from several American educational institutions. The scheme was fully discussed in a general and formal manner. Full information of the proceedings was not disclosed, but it is known that a mutual agreement was arrived at as to the course to be adopted in forwarding the consummation of the project, and that it will be gone on with if it can be done at a reasonable outlay.

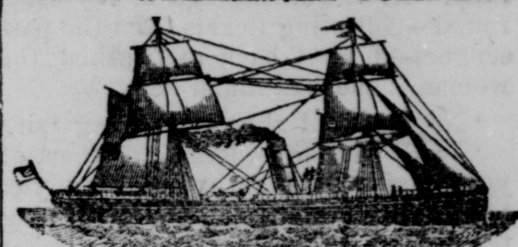
