Once autumn comes along, many Canadian born birds begin to find marketing a tiresome affair. Of course this is not true for seed eaters, because great quantities of their favourite food, especially weed seeds, can be found throughout the country.

As long as ocean going vessels are in our ports, they continue to attract Gulls, which feed on refuse almost exclusively, when possible. Otherwise these birds shop around for fish, crustaceans, and sometimes insects, young birds, or mice.

Although most Hawks are fond of our ever present rodents, they too find marketing difficult as winter draws in. Therefore the majority start migration in late autumn, before there is danger of snow covering up their prey.

The tiny Hummingbirds are now getting on their way. For them marketing in Canada ends when our nectar-producing flowers are over. Diminutive insects found at the heart of these blossoms are their only other food.

With the exception of Woodpeckers, which are able to find wood-boring grubs on our tree trunks at all seasons, insectivorous birds are badly off as autumn advances and there are few insects left. A month or more ago Swallows began to flock, ready for their southern trek.

Berry pickers, like Robins and Purple Finches, will be able to gather sufficient nourishment for several months yet. Birds that enjoy dried fruits are next most fortunate to the seed eaters, because mountain ash berries, choke-
