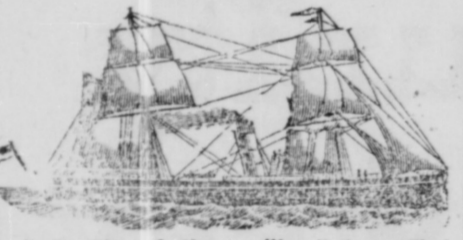

The Transvaal War

Forced Unwilling Hands.

Is there a man in Canada to-day who does not hang his head in shame that the Canadian Government has had to be forced to act by an outburst of popular sentiment in favor of sending a Canadian contingent to the Transvaal? On the fourth instant, the Prime Minister gave out to the public through the Toronto Globe a statement that Canada could not equip and send a regiment to the Transvaal without a vote of Parliament, which he had failed to ask for before Parliament was prorogued. Mr. Tarte, who has ruled the present Parliament, said, and said it over and over again: "Canadians shall not go to fight for England." During all this time the English members of the Cabinet were dumb. Not a voice did they raise to put Canada in its right position. Then there came a whirlwind of popular indignation from Vancouver to Halifax. The political lives of the Ministers were in danger, and some of the members of the Cabinet began to realize that the whirlwind would ultimately hurl them from power. Weeks of dallying, waiting, halting, were the result, trampling the flag under foot, exhibiting to the world a display of absolute cowardice. When it has taken precious months to drive the Government into doing its duty, and while the other colonies were offering their best sons in the time of the Empire's need, is it any wonder Canadians are to-day asking themselves this question:—"If England's war were with a first class power, such as France or Russia, with Canada's shores threatened by invasion, what straits might the present rulers of the Dominion not have put us in by tying the hands of the loyal population, who without Government grace could not move a hand or foot?" There is food for deep and long reflection in this thought.—Montreal Star.

Kipling for War.

Rudyard Kipling did not speak at the political meeting held at Brighton in support of the Government's policy in the Transvaal matter, as it was announced that he would, but sent a letter to the organizers, in which he said that he would support the Government unreservedly in its demand for equal rights for all whitemen from Cape Colony to the Zambesi river, and in its aim to establish a Republic instead of an oligarchy. Mr. Kipling's letter was as follows:—

I see the papers have generously credited me with the intention of speaking at your meeting, but as I pointed out when the association did me the honor to invite me, public speaking is entirely out of my way. I need not say I am entirely in sympathy with the object of the meeting, and realize our country's obligation at this crisis to support Her Majesty's Government unreservedly. Their demand, I take it to be, is for equal rights for all white men from the Cape to the Zambesi, their aim the abolishment of an oligarchy, and their vindication a new and regenerate Transvaal, governed under equal laws formed in open council by free men, neither corrupted nor coerced, representing every interest in the land. These things are good and desirable, and I recognize that it is the duty of each one of us, according to his abilities, to work towards their attainment. With every wish for thorough success of the meeting, I am yours sincerely.

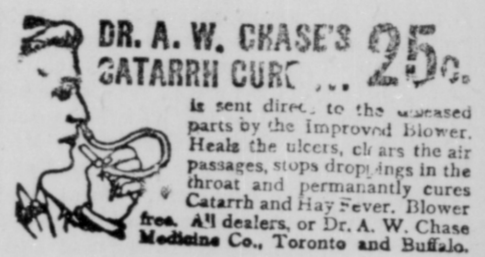
