

Bank Manager Shot And Killed In Ontario Town

BLIND RIVER, Ont. (CP) — Two gunmen killed the Royal Bank of Canada branch manager in this Northern Ontario mining town Wednesday, failed to get any money in their holdup attempt and then shot up the main street before stealing a getaway car.

J. J. Walter Bridges, 50, and a native of Strathclair, Man., died of a bullet through his heart, coroner Dr. J. Pigeon reported. He had been bank manager here for 12 years.

Ontario provincial police organized a posse to scour the bushland surrounding this uranium mining town, 65 miles east of Sault Ste. Marie and reported later the getaway car was found abandoned. The Ontario land and forests department offered a helicopter to aid the search.

The police hunt later was concentrated on an area about 15 miles north of here, between Granary and Clear Lakes, after

two hunters reported they were fired on in that district. The helicopter and two other planes were called off the hunt. Police said this might lull the fugitives into thinking the search had been suspended for the night, although ground forces continued to move in.

Meanwhile, provincial police arranged to fly a bloodhound here from Winnipeg to track the robbers.

BOTH ARMED Police said the men were armed with a rifle and an automatic pistol. The Royal Bank in Montreal immediately offered the "unusually large" reward of \$25,000 for information leading to an arrest and conviction. The Ontario attorney-general's department later added \$2,500 to the reward money.

The daylight attack was bold and swift and left this frontier town in a frenzy of excitement. Here is the story pieced together

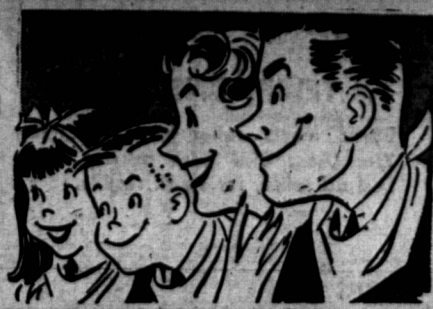

"Safety" Is Newest Project Of Canadian Jr. Red Cross

According to a statement issued last evening by Provincial Red Cross Headquarters, the promotion of safety at home and at play is the newest project of the Canadian Junior Red Cross. The plan for the current school year is based on a classroom calendar now being distributed to schools throughout Prince Edward Island. This colorful calendar outlines the various factors of safety for youth. It is accompanied by a teacher's guide for instructional purposes. The calendar was designed on the advice of leading safety officials in co-operation with educational authorities.

A miniature of the calendar is also being sent to all school children enrolled in the Junior Red Cross. These are intended for the youngsters' rooms in their homes, and include a guide for parents to supplement the

instructions given by teachers in the classroom.

This project which is now in effect all across Canada was announced locally yesterday by Mr. K.A. Parker, Chairman of the Junior Red Cross Committee for Prince Edward Island. He said that safety authorities are alarmed by the increasing number of accidents among children in the home and at play. "It is the hope of the Canadian Junior Red Cross that this project will make our youth more conscious of safety," Mr. Parker added. "The teachers have promised their full co-operation, and their effort will undoubtedly give a new interpretation of the rules of safety to children in their care. This, supplemented by the interest of parents, will no doubt play a major role in the reduction of accidents of all kinds."
