HANDSOME DWELLING HOUSE.

Built at Brighton by Mr. C. Pope Fletcher.

The many handsome private residences that have been erected at Brighton during the past few years have just received a most attractive addition. For this addition credit must be given Mr. C. Pope Fletcher, the well known music dealer. On the northern side of the road Mr. Fletcher has erected a two-story dwelling house of the modern style of architecture and fitted throughout in the latest and most approved manner. The house is 38 feet square, and has a lawn in front and stable and coach house in the rear. There are four rooms on the first floor, besides pantry, porch and large hall.

The parlour and sitting room occupy the entire front of the house, and are connected by folding doors. There is an elegant oak mantel in the sitting room. The sitting room also has a bay window, which runs up to the roof.

The dining room and kitchen occupy the rear of the house; and the pantry is reached from the kitchen and front hall. The pantry is fitted with glass cases and cupboards. Opening off the kitchen there is a large scullery, with stairway to cellar and door to yard.

The hall is reached from the southeast corner of the house through an arched entrance porch, the stairway having turned birch finish.

There are four bedrooms and a bath room on the second floor of the house. The rooms are all large and square. The bathroom is fitted with porcelain-enameled tub, marble wash basin, etc.

There is a large balcony over the front entrance from which a splendid view of the harbor may be obtained.

All the windows have inside shutters, and the attic is finished in two large rooms.

The house was built by Mr. W. W. Harber from plans made by Mr. C. B. Chappell. The plumbing was done by Shaw & Beavisto, and the painting by Mr. James Edmonds. The house is to be heated by a Quebec heater.

A BAND OF FIENDS AT WORK IN WHITE SANDS.

Sir,—It appears that some persons in this community were fishing and canning lobsters contrary to the Statutes of Canada. The fishery warden having discovered their traps gave them to mercy of the wind and tide. BIG GUN SHOOTING.

Annual Competition at Kinloch Range—Signalling Corps.

The annual gun practice of the 4th Regiment, P. E. I. Artillery, took place yesterday at Kinloch range, Lot 43. The firing began at ten o'clock and continued until three. Two 40-pounder Armstrong guns were used, and three targets were fired at the range being from 220 to 2500 yards.

Five batteries competed, Charlottetown being represented by two and Montagu, Georgetown and Souris by one each. Each battery was represented by a detachment of sixteen men and two officers.

Col. Wilson, R. C. A., was chief range officer, and Lieut. McLaughlin was the officer in charge of the targets.

Some excellent shooting was done and good scores made.

We regret that we are unable to give the scores made by the different detachments. It may be stated however, that Col. Wilson warmly complimented No 1 Company upon their drill and style, which he said was perfect, and for which he gave them full points, something that he had never done for any other company during his long service as inspector of artillery.

A new and decidedly interesting feature of the competition was the splendid work performed by a detachment of Engineers under command of Sergeant Dull. Despatches were sent almost as rapidly as by telegraph, expediting the work very materially. This is, we believe, the only corps of the kind in the Dominion.

Altogether the work performed by our artillerymen was of the best description, and they well deserve the praise bestowed on them by Colonel Wilson.

MISS HOWISON'S LECTURE.

For those who love good literature, and for Scotchmen, particularly, the "Night with Burns," by Miss Jean Howison was delightful. Interwoven with an interesting account of the life and character of Burns were a number of his finest passages, poetic gems—among the finest in the language. At the beginning of her lecture, Miss Howison referred to the pleasures and advantages derived by those who possess a taste for good reading. The cultivation of this taste in Charlottetown might be greatly aided by the formation of reading clubs at the meetings of which the works of a favorite poet or prose writer might be read and discussed. MORE GOLD.—The Truro News says The owners of the Jubilee Gold Mine, Reufrew, a few days ago returned 131 oz. of gold from 1/2 ton of ore—\$5,200, from one half a ton of quartz is almost unparalleled in the history of gold mining.

RICH GOLD DISCOVERY.—News has been received at Victoria of the finding of gold quartz at Skaguay, going \$1000 to the ton. The news comes from a very reliable source, and although the exact location is not made known, it is within a very short distance of the Gateway City.

THE PRIZE RING.—It is announced that articles of agreement for a fight between James J. Corbett and Thomas Sharkey, to take place on November 22nd, under the auspices of the Lennox Athletic club, for a purse of \$20,000, have been signed. A forfeit of \$2,500 is to be deposited by both parties and by the club to guarantee the fulfillment of the articles.

FLOATING ELEVATORS.—According to a late Halifax despatch John McInnes and Ald. Musgrave have returned from Montreal, where they have been obtaining information re floating elevators in use there. The idea is to build one to be used in Halifax harbor, so that vessels can be supplied with grain without docking. These elevators hold between 70,000 and 80,000 bushels of grain and cost about \$15,000. The matter has been considered by the council and board of trade.

THE RICHEST WOMAN.—Mrs. Richard King, of Texas, is probably the richest woman in the United States, not excepting Mrs. Hetty Green. Her wealth is partly inherited from her father, a pioneer Presbyterian clergyman, the first who ever went, staff and Bible in hand, to preach the gospel to Indians and mixed races that peopled the vast domain over which his own little daughter was destined to hold sway as a landed proprietor. Mrs. King is a widow, and her landed estates in Southern Tex is amount to 1,250,000 acres, or about 2,600 square miles.
