DEATH OF A VALUABLE COW.—The noted Jersey cow, Princess 2nd, belonging to the estate of the late Mr. Shoemaker, Baltimore, Md., died August 12th. It is stated, from a disease of the lungs. Her late owner paid \$4,800 for her at a public sale in New York city on May 10, 1882. She made a record of 46 lbs. 12 1/2 oz. of butter during the week begun 22nd of last February.

THE mortality statistics for July of the principal cities of Canada have been printed. The death rate is as follows: Montreal, 6.7; Toronto, 20.4; Quebec, 25.3; Hamilton, 6.9; Halifax, 5.9; Winnipeg, 26; Ottawa, 8.5; St. John, 4.6; Kingston, 3.4. In Montreal the deaths were more numerous than for the corresponding month last year, and 125 greater than in June of the present year. The unusual mortality is due entirely to the outbreak of small-pox, there being fifty-two deaths from this disease during the month.

In former years that practice was the cause of much annoyance, and Messrs. Tuckett & Son were compelled to resort to the law courts to put a stop to it. Though they have not met with any cases of the kind lately, it is always a safe precaution for the purchaser to see that the trade mark T & B in bronze letters is stamped upon each plug, no plug ever leaves the factory without it, and to appropriate the trade mark is a punishable offence.

THE Somerset Races took place at the Driving Park of John O'Ronaghan, Esq., J. P., yesterday. In the three minute class, as there were four entries, James Arsenault's Harry Messenger took first money; J. D. Enman's Flora E. second; and P. A. Connor's Abadallah, third. This was a well contested race, Flora E. taking the two first heats in good style, and Harry Messenger winning the last three heats. In the free-for-all there were seven entries. The first money was taken by Jas. Heffel's French Sporter, Howard Farrow's Flora, second. The judges were Patrick Duffy, Capt. Irving and John Sharp.

THE kind of girl they grow in Rose Valley is illustrated by the following incident which took place at Bradalbane last week:—One of the fair maids of the valley drove in a single wagon and pulled up in front of a store occupied by a well-known cat speculator.
