Literature And Life

MATTHEW ARNOLD'S "DOVE BEACH"

Matthew Arnold in his essay on the poetry of Gray tries to account for the smallness of Gray's poetic output, and declares that it was because he fell on "an age of prose." By that he obviously meant that the literary atmosphere of the writer's time had effect on his literary productions both in regard to style of composition, and the amount of work he did. Now this applies to Arnold himself. Take "Dover Beach." It is full of pain — pain of the spirit. We recall the fact that science had come into conflict with religion, and Darwin had shocked the world with his theory of evolution. Arnold shows in his literary and theological essays — productions like "God and the Bible," and "Literature and Dogma," "Culture and Anarchy" — how the old theories are no longer satisfactory.

The poem, "Dover Beach" is quite characteristically Arnoldian. There is sadness and pathos about it and this is like Arnold. There is "the eternal note of sadness." The setting is evening and he and his wife are sitting looking at the water — Dover Beach. The sea is calm and the moon lies fair on the straits. We recall Wordsworth's line — "the sea that bares her bosom to the moon." Likely it was in the mind of Arnold, for he was an avowed Wordsworthian.

He and his wife listen to the tide; there is the grating roar of pebbles as the tide moves them along the strand. This brings the eternal note of sadness to the listeners. He says that the Greek poet, Sophocles, heard the same songs by the Aegean long ago, and it spoke of "human misery." It had its own meaning for Arnold, the modern poet.

The sea of faith was once full and the tide was high. It was as though a "bright girdle encircled the globe," but now things have changed; the tides are retreating and all he can hear is "the melancholy, long withdrawing roar"

along the naked shingles of the world.
"People had lost their moorings, and in the sea of life enlaid, we million mortals live alone."

At the close of the poem, he bids his companion — likely his wife — "Ah, love let us be true to one another, for the world had no real healing power — no joy, or love or light, no certitude, no peace, no help for pain; it is like a darkling plain, where ignorant armies are clashing by night — surely a sad enough picture. Matthew Arnold was a lovely soul. I recall how a minister in Halifax said that he was in a school in England when Arnold was inspector and he was the soul of kindness — very gentle with the children. One can imagine that after he has read Arnold in prose or verse.

If you read "Rugby Chapel," an elegy on his father, the famous master of Rugby, you will recognize how he valued the real things.
