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DISMISSAL OF CAPTAIN OF DREDGE NOT DUE TO FAULT

In Reply to Questions in House Minister of Public Works Admits There Were no Charges Against Captain McDonald, Dismissed Merely to Please Party Friends.

In the House of Commons Mr. Hocken asked Hon. Mr. King, Minister of Public Works a number of questions regarding the dismissal of Captain John N. McDonald, Inspector of Dredges the questions and answers being as follows:

Congregation Honor Pastor At Hertz Memorial Hall

Farewell Congregational Social in Honor of Rev. Mr. Glendenning Who Leaves Shortly to Take Over His New Pastorate at Wesley Memorial Church, Moncton.

There was a large attendance of the congregation of the Methodist Church at Hertz Memorial Hall last night, where the farewell congregational social in honor of the pastor, Rev. G. W. F. Glendenning and Mrs. Glendenning was held, with Mr. E. T. Higgs, M. L. A., presiding.
After preliminary remarks by the chairman a vocal solo by Mrs. Fletcher and an enjoyable reading by Miss Henrietta Raekham "The House by the Side of the Road" which was warmly enjoyed. Mr. Glendenning was presented with addresses by the various church organizations, accompanied by the presentation of a handsome club bag to Mrs. Glendenning on behalf of the Women's Missionary Society and of a valuable watch guard by the congregation and locket suitably engraved to Mr. Glendenning from the congregation.
Little girls of the congregation presented Mrs. Glendenning with flowers.
During the evening ice cream and cake was served by the Ladies Aid.
The address from the congregation, read by Mr. G. H. Holbrook, was as follows:
Charlottetown, P. E. Island, June 26th, 1922.
Rev. G. W. F. Glendenning, M. A. B. C. L.
Reverend and Dear Sir:
Three years ago you assumed the pastorate of this, probably the largest church in the New Brunswick and P. E. Island Conference. You entered upon your ministry with a high and holy purpose, and with a lofty ambition to carry on the work of your beloved Master. We knew little of you, and your capabilities, but we gave you a glad and cordial welcome. Tonight we have gathered here in the light of past experiences, and with a full knowledge of what you have accomplished, to bid you a regretful farewell, and assure you that our prayers and good wishes follow you to your new sphere of labor.
You came to us at a time when our church needed as it never did before, the services of a man blessed by God, with an infinite amount of patience, and the happy faculty of being able to pour the oil of fatherly advice on the troubled waters of doubt and uncertainty. The congregations of Grace and First Church were only recently united. Many embarrassing questions had to be adjusted. It was a time for finesse and diplomacy, but your wise counsel and judicious, impartial and far-seeing judgment, smoothed away all apparent obstacles, and united both bodies into one harmonious whole, and today we are as one big family, raising our voices in songs of praise and adoration to the Supreme Being, and singing aloud "Blest be the tie that binds our hearts in Christian Love."
After the churches were properly united, you had regular routine work of tremendous magnitude to perform, work of which we have but a very slight conception. As a preacher, you have consistently preached the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Your sermons have at all times appealed to the very highest and best in us. They have stimulated and encouraged, they have shown "The Way, the Truth and the Light," and have helped us to walk there.
But it is as a pastor that you are especially beloved. A clergyman may preach till the Crock of Doom, and unless he acquires the personal touch his message may have little effect. Christ said, "By their works ye shall know them," and beyond the peradventure of a doubt Christ will have a very special reward for you, for the works you have performed in the homes of your people. As the Good Shepherd watches over his Sheep, so you watched over us. You have visited us under all circumstances; you have come with your bright smile and cheerful conversation in our hours of joy and gladness; you have sprinkled the water upon the Babe, and proclaimed a new soul for the Master; you have spoken words of comfort, and helped to soothe our aching hearts when the Angel of Death had brought sadness upon us, truly you have ministered to us from the cradle to the grave. You will carry away with you the love of those associated. As Preacher, Teacher, Brother, Friend, you have lived in a very special way, lived in your everyday life the precept and example of the beloved Nazarine as He moved among the people of Galilee, healing them and doing them good.
And now as you are about to remove with your dear helpmate to continue your work in another portion of the Master's vineyard, we trust that the blessing of God may follow you, and that the fruits of your labors will be most abundant.
Before you go, we wish to present you, on behalf of the congregation with this memento, and we would have you think that it is emblematic of that Golden Chain of Friendship, which during your pastoralate here, you have forged around and about every one of us, linking us to you, and the Great Father above. In the locket attached, we trust you will carry a picture of the homes you have visited, and of the pleasant associations you have formed.

Chinatown Raided In Boston, Mass.

\$300,000 Worth of Opium Seized and 13 Chinamen Arrested.

(Special to The Guardian.)
BOSTON, MASS., June 27—In the biggest raid ever conducted by U. S. Revenue Officers in Boston, six opium dens in the heart of Chinatown were entered, opium and lay-outs valued at more than \$300,000 were seized and thirteen Chinese were arrested. Scores of papers, letters and alien seamen's identification cards were unearthed by Dr. Ruth, who is emphatic in his declaration that these are direct and conclusive evidence of the operation of the gigantic smuggling ring which has been running into Boston by the wholesale. The evidence Dr. Ruth will turn over to the immigration authorities together with eleven of the thirteen Chinese who, he asserts, were smuggled here. The raid was accompanied by a number of hand to hand fights, in which the Federal men and members of the police Narcotic Squad fought desperately for their lives with the drug crazed addicts.

Michael Collins Takes Action in Dublin

Orders the Arrest of Rebel Leader Which is Promptly Effected and Restoration Order Expected.

DUBLIN, June 24—Free State forces struck at the insurrection in the heart of Dublin today. Michael Collins, head of the Provisional Government, ordered his troops to get out of Dublin. The arrest of Henderson, moreover, showed the Free State Government intends to lose no time in complying with Churchill's ultimatum, delivered in the Commons yesterday, to restore order.

This is no doubt the result of the intimation contained in the supplementary estimates brought down in the House on Monday, which showed that \$6,000 additional subsidy had been budgeted for the Constance's competitor, S.S. Magalene, leaving the Constance without any subsidy whatever.
